Good luck, ARS, and best wishes to the next Board of Directors!


# GOAL REACHED IN PRESIDENT'S APPEAL

# ARS EDUCATION PROGRAM Teachers' Seminar Planned

The Education Committe of the ARS announces that Achievement Examinations for Levels I, II and III have been revised to correlate with the new Study Guides. The new Level III Exam will be ready by the time of the summer ARS workshops. Levels I and II wil be ready for Chapters to start administering in the fall. Level IV materials are now available from the ARS office on request.

A new summer seminar for teachers is being planned for 1985. The ARS has long been seeking a replacement for the old Teachers Exam that was available from 1961 to 1977. Those who passed the Exam were "certified teachers" and could be hired for ARS workshops. An asterisk was placed beside their names in the annual Directory. When the examination was abolished in 1977 the Board of Directors agreed that measuring teaching skills was an almost impossible task, and that the ARS would have to find some other way to give recognition and approval to members of the teaching community who deserved it.

The first step was the creation of the Achievement program: the Study Guide and the Examinations would provide a learning incentive and a measuring rod for achievement as a player. But what of teachers? The teachers' seminar seemed to the Committee to be the answer. This Seminar is planned to be held bienially, for one week in the summer, not conflicting with any of the other summer workshops. The Director of the seminar is to be chosen by the Education Committee, approved by the Board of Directors of the ARS, and rotated, if possible, each time the Seminar is held. The location of the Seminar will also change to different area of the U.S.A.

The program of the Seminar will include classes in topics of special interest and value to teachers of the recorder, i.e., teaching children, teaching the elderly and arranging for recorders handicapped, conducting. Lectures, panels, classes and discussion groups will be led by master teachers of the recorder. To qualify for an ARS Teachers Certificate, it will be necessary to pass the Level III Exam (before, during or after the Seminar), to attend all classes at one Seminar with satisfactory completion of all assignments (including a written report), and to submit to the Education Committee a resume of teaching experience with references.

The Director of the first ARS Teachers' Seminar will be Martha Reynolds, professor of music at Southwestern Texas State University in Austin. Dr. Reynolds holds a Ph.D. in music education. The Seminar will be held in Austin the week of June 16-22, 1985. Anyone now a teacher of the recorder or intereh d in teaching it should consider attending this important event. Full plans will be published in the fall of 1984.

LIRF: A large donation for Arthur Nitka Memorial Scholarships was given to the LIRF Workshop by Arthur's son Larry. These scholarships are being distributed to members of three organizations that have supported and encouraged LIRF throughout their 16 year history: the Suffolk County Music Educators Assoc., the Nassau Music Educators Assoc., and the Long Island chapter of the American Orff Schulwerk Association.

MIDWEST WORKSHOP: This summer's Midwest Breve Week will offer a teaching-methods class entitled "By Our Students We Are Taught." The classes will set musical premises, complete with music and players, and discuss ways to teach this music. This class is not only for teachers! In attempting improve a piece, participants will learn what must be done and new ideas should surface. It can be exciting for all levels of players.

This is the moment. Ballots for the 1984 election of the Board of Directors of the American Recorder Society are now ready for mailing via first class mail to the ARS membership in mid-April. Proposed revisions of the ARS By-Laws will also be sent at this time.

The first-class mailing will cost the Society some \$1000 more than a bulk mailing, but the current Board has decided the election is too important to risk the disenfranchisement of any member. We at the ARS office sincerely hope that you will feel the same. Board elections are held only once every four years. This is your opportunity to shape the future of the Society.

In the 1980 election only 335 members voted (about 13% of all members at that time). The election was a close one, and even one more ballot would probably have changed the results.

Please read the information carefully, think about the candidates, and cast your vote for ten directors, following instructions. If you should not receive a ballot by June 1st, call or write the ARS office immediately. If you write, include a mailing label from either the Newsletter or the magaine. You will receive a replacement ballot immediately. To be counted, all ballots must be received in the ARS office no later than June 22nd.
