It is not necessary to be enrolled at a workshop to attend the Membership Meeting and we hope that everyone who lives near a workshop will attend one.



NEW! ARS PRESIDENT'S SCHOLARSHIPS TO THE SUMMER WORKSHOPS

Seven new full-tuition scholarships are available to members for the ARS summer workshops. These scholarships are made possible by contributions to the President's Appeal. Scholarships will be awarded for any combination of the following criteria: (1) financial need, (2) musical merit and promise on recorder, (3) possible benefit to other members as a result of the scholarship (e.g., through teaching or directing a chapter). All else being equal, preference will be given to those who have not already attended a weeklong workshop.

The application deadline has been extended to <u>April 24</u>. Applications must be accompanied by a \$25 deposit. The deposit will be applied towards room and board at a workshop or will be refunded if a scholarship is not awarded. Applications are available from the ARS office.

The ARS will continue to award the twothirds tuition scholarships that have been offered in recent summers for chapter members. Details have been sent to chapter officers. We must announce with great sorrow that Andrew Acs, beloved teacher, performer, administrator and friend to many members of the American Recorder Society, died February 3rd, 1987 after a long and heroic battle against his illness. Remembrances of Andrew by his friends and colleagues will appear in the May issue of <u>The American Recorder</u>.

Andrew made his mark early, as a teacher, performer and administrator. He directed both the ARS and its largest chapter, the New York Recorder Guild, when he was still in his early twenties. For the Society he was administrative director, office manager, keeper of the books, chapter coordinator and all around trouble-shooter. Later he was a member of the Board of Directors. For the New York Recorder Guild he was executive director, music director, concert manager and director of the New York Recorder Guild School.

A wearer of many hats, Andrew was an excellent performer on the recorder, oboe and viola da gamba. But it was as a teacher and an organizer that he will be remembered most. In both these roles he was an invaluable contributor to the faculty of early music workshops. Andrew had a great sensitivity to the needs of other people, and a unique ability to understand and sympathize with his students. He was very much loved and admired, and he will be most terribly missed.

The Board of Directors of the American Recorder Society has resolved to establish an Andrew Acs Scholarship Fund. Proceeds from this fund will be used to provide scholarships to ARS workshops. 




