### Katz Composition Contest Update: Music for Recorder and Voice

The Trustees will conduct another composition contest in 1988. Entries will be judged by the Katz Fund Trustees, with the final selection to be made by Hans Ulrich Staeps. This competition will be for an original piece of 4-7 minutes duration for one to four recorders with one vocal part. It should be playable by upper intermediate players (ARS Levels II-III).

The purpose of the contest is to encourage new works for recorders that will enrich the contemporary repertoire and appeal to the serious amateur recorder player.

The deadline for entries is July 1st, 1988. For complete rules and an application form, write to the ARS office. A self-addressed, stamped business-sized envelope will be appreciated.


### **Election Update**

### Conrad Susa Commissioned To Write New Work In Celebration of 50th Anniversary

Composer Conrad Susa has been commissioned to compose a work for recorder and string quartet as part of the Society's 50th anniversary celebration in 1989. The Susa work will be performed by leading recorder players throughout the United States.

Susa, 53, is a native of Pennsylvania who now makes his home in San Francisco. He studied at Carnegie-Mellon University with Nikolai Lopatnikoff, and at the Juilliard School, where he was a composition student of William Bergsma and Vincent Persichetti. He also studied piano privately with Natalie Barnett Phillips, and served as staff pianist with the Pittsburgh Symphony under William Steinberg. Known principally for his music theater works and television scores, Mr. Susa has also written for chorus and chamber ensembles. He received fellowships from the Ford Foundation and the National Endowment for the Arts.

Susa's first two operas, <u>Transformations</u> and <u>Black River</u>, were commissioned and premiered by the Minnesota Opera, in 1972 and 1974. <u>Transformations</u> has also been performed on PBS and at the Spoleto Festival U.S.A.

Other recent commissions have come from the San Francisco Opera and PEPSICO/Summerfare, the San Diego Men's Chorus, and oboist Bert Lucarelli with an NEA Consortium Commissioning grant. Mr. Susa is presently resident composer for the Old Globe Theater in San Diego and serves as dramaturge for the O'Neill Center in Connecticut.

"The recorder is an old friend," said Mr. Susa; "I've used it in at least a dozen scores for Shakespeare's plays at the Old Globe, and I'm attracted by the challenge of combining it with string quartet."

Bay-area professional recorder player Marilyn Boenau is serving as recorder consultant to Mr. Susa during the composition of the work.


### ARS 50 Photo Contest!!

Winners will be announced in the Fall, 1988 Newsletter. First prize will be a free ARS membership for five years, second prize three years, third prize one year.

Why are we doing this? Photos are needed for our major ARS 50 membership drive, to be launched in the fall with the goal of 5,000 members for our fiftieth birthday. All the winning photos, and probably several honorable-mention ones as well, will be used on posters, in advertisements, and on our membership solicitation envelopes (all with photo credits, of course). Captivating, humorous, inspiring, or touching photos will add tremendous weight to the campaign.

Do you work with, or near, a photostat machine? Has it ever shown signs of wishing to support the arts?



The ARS Education Program provides exams which allow you to test your skills and evaluate the progress you have made. The Level I and II exams are administered by the chapters and at some workshops. If there is not a chapter near you, arrangements can be made for a musician in your community to administer the exam. Level III exams are given by members of the ARS Education Committee or someone appointed by them.
