MANY SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE To ARS-Endorsed Summer Workshops

A total of 27 scholarships will be available for ARS members to attend any of the eight 1988 summer workshops endorsed by the ARS. The application deadline is <u>April 15th</u> for all types of scholarships. The names of recipients will be announced in May.

President's Scholarships cover full tuition and are made possible by contributions to the President's Appeal. Scholarships may be awarded for any combination of the following criteria: (1) financial need, (2) musical merit and promise on recorder, (3) desire for personal enrichment, (4) potential benefit to others of applicant's increased knowledge (e.g., through teaching). All else being equal, preference will be given to those who have not already attended an ARS-endorsed week-long workshop.

The Andrew Acs Scholarship Fund will provide four full-tuition scholarships to members who teach or would like to teach recorder. These scholarships are made possible by income from the many contributions given in memory of Andrew Acs in 1987.

Write to the ARS office for application forms for the President's Scholarships and for the Acs Scholarships.

Up to sixteen <u>Chapter/Collegium Scholarships</u> will also be available. These scholarships are awarded to recognize the important contribution made to chapters by individuals and also the contributions made to academic ensembles by their members.

These scholarships are funded equally by the ARS and the individual workshops. They cover 2/3 tuition, with the student responsible for the remaining 1/3 tuition as well as room and board. Chapters or Collegium Members may nominate up to two of their members for these scholarships by means of a letter explaining why their candidates were nominated: past or anticipated contribution to the chapter, need for additional study, exceptional promise, etc. The chapter letter must be signed by two chapter officers, the collegium letter by the director.

Interested members should contact their Chapter Representative or Collegium Director to apply.

CALIFORNIA RECORDER FESTIVAL

E. NAKAMICHI BAROQUE FESTIVAL: June 22-26, Los Angeles, California

The University of California at Los Angeles Department of Music will present "Roman Baroque," the second E. Nakamichi Baroque Music Festival. The Festival will take place over five days in several venues on the UCLA Westwood campus. Events will include major concerts, recitals, panel discussions, workshops, an exhibition, and the first fully staged performance in the U.S. of Stefano Landi's historic opera Sant' Alessio.

The Festival will open with a concert June 22nd celebrating 17th-century Rome given by the ensemble "Les sonatistes" (formerly "Les goûts réunis"). Nicholas McGegan will direct Sant' Alessio, with performances on June 23rd, 24th, and 25th at 8:00 p.m. in Schoenberg Auditorium. Performers will include Judith Nelson, David Thomas, Julianne Baird, Drew Minter, other soloists and the New York Baroque Dance Company led by Catherine Turocy.

A workshop on baroque instruments and instrumental music is scheduled for the morning of June 25th. Noon concerts will feature guest artists Paul O'Dette and Yuko Hayashi.

An exhibition of instruments, music, books, and records will be held in the Ackerman Union Grand Ballroom June 22nd-26th. The ARS will have a booth at the exhibition and we hope to see many of our West Coast members there!

FOUR RECEIVE HONORABLE MENTION IN KATZ COMPOSITION CONTEST

The Trustees of the Erich Katz Memorial Fund of the American Recorder Society have announced four Honorable Mentions in the Katz Fund's second annual recorder consort composition contest. The four compositions, and their composers, are the following:

- -"Sonata for Three Alto Recorders" by Lee Gannon of Nashville, Tennessee;
- -"Three Hymn Preludes" by David Goldstein of New York, New York;
- -"Quintet" by John Kitts of Gainesville, Florida; and
- -"Five Moods" by Carolyn Peskin of Shaker Heights, Ohio.

No first prize was awarded in this year's contest.

The Trustees are moving forward with plans to publish at least some of the high-ranking pieces from the 1986 and 1987 contests under the imprint of the Erich Katz Memorial Fund in limited editions. The first piece to be published, in early 1988, will be Frederick Palmer's quartet, "Entrevista," winner of the 1986 contest.

1988 KATZ COMPOSITION CONTEST: MUSIC FOR RECORDER AND VOICE

The Trustees will conduct another composition contest in 1988. This competition will be for an original piece of 4-7 minutes duration for one to four recorders with one vocal part. It should be playable by upper intermediate players (ARS Levels II-III).

The purpose of the contest is to encourage new works for recorders that will enrich the contemporary repertoire and appeal to the serious amateur recorder player.





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
