WADDY THOMPSON DEPARTS

Waddy Thompson, who served in our national office for seven years, first as Administrative and then as Executive Director, has left the American Recorder Society to join the American Music Center as its Administrator. Many of the members of the American Recorder Society have come to know and depend on Waddy. His cheery voice on the telephone and unflagging aid to both chapter officers and members with their problems, as well his meticulous care in running the ARS office and keeping up records on a computerized system, will be very much missed.

When Waddy took over, the ARS office was much in need of more careful management. Within a few months he had totally computerized the membership, subscription and financial records, started publishing an annual Directory, and inreased income by 30% with more efficient recordkeeping.

But Waddy did much more than put the affairs of the ARS in order. He instigated and took full responsibility for production of the annual appeal letters. He was active as an ex-officio member of all committees. He administered the Teaching Seminar for the Education Committee and assisted in the preparation of the second revised edition of the Study Guides. He ran two Board elections and he oversaw the revision of the By-Laws of the ARS four years ago. He also produced this Newsletter from its beginning.

And it was Waddy's idea to take note of the ARS's 50th birthday with a year-long celebration in 1989!

1989 ERICH KATZ MEMORIAL FUND COMPOSITION CONTEST

The Trustees of the Erich Katz Memorial Fund of the American Recorder Society announce the fourth annual contest for original compositions for recorders. The 1989 contest is for <u>Recorder Duets</u>. Compositions may be for any two recorders, not necessarily the same throughout the work, and should be from 2 to 5 minutes in duration. The parts should be of equal interest and playable by intermediate to high intermediate players.

Entries will be judged on musical interest, attractiveness to the listener, idiomatic use of recorders and playability at the defined level. The winning composition will be published by the American Recorder Society, and the composer will receive a prize of \$400.

Erich Katz was a driving force in the American Recorder Society from the late 1940's through the 1950's. The Erich Katz Memorial Fund was established by the ARS in 1973 to honor the inspired leadership Dr. Katz gave to the Society during his lifetime. The fund helps to further the aims of the American Recorder Society by providing scholarships for deserving students as well as promoting the composition of new works for the recorder.

ARS SCHOLARSHIPS

Seven full-tuition President's Scholarships are available to members for use at the ARS-endorsed summer workshops. These scholarships are made possible by contributions to the President's Appeal. Scholarships will be awarded for any combination of the following criteria: 1) financial need, 2) musical merit, and 3) potential benefit to other members or to a chapter as a result of increased teaching and musical skills.

The Andrew Acs Scholarship Fund also provides full-tuition scholarships, intended for those members who teach or would like to teach recorder. This year four Acs Scholarships are available; income for these is generated by income from the many contributions given in memory of Andrew Acs.

FOUR NEW CHAPTERS FORMED!


In an auspicious opening to our anniversary year, we proudly announce the recent formation of four new chapters of the ARS:

BOSTON EARLY MUSIC FESTIVAL

Once again we expect to see many members of the American Recorder Society at the Boston Early Music Festival, which will take place this year from May 28 to June 4th. As usual, the focal point of the Festival will be the exhibition by more than 130 makers of medieval, renaissance, baroque, classical and early romantic period instruments. The Festival will also present American and European early music artists in fifteen concerts of music ranging from the 12th century to the late 18th century.

Special events for ARS members will include a master class with the distinguished Dutch recorder virtuoso Marion Verbruggen (admission free with your ARS 50 Card!), and a reception featuring the presentation of the ARS Distinguished Achievement Award to one of our distinguished members whose identity will not be revealed 'til shortly before the Festival.

NEW ARS-ENDORSED WORKSHOPS IN CALIFORNIA!

The ARS is proud to welcome to the company of ARS-endorsed workshops the San Francisco Early Music Society Summer Workshops and the Canto Antiguo Summer Workshop.

The ARS is endorsing four of the workshops presented by SFEMS this summer: the Recorder Workshop, directed by David Barnett (June 25-July 1); the Baroque Music Workshop, directed by Anna Carol Dudley (June 25-July 8); the Medieval Music Workshop, directed by Robert Dawson (July 30-August 5); and the Renaissance Music Workshop, directed by Margaret Panofsky and Jane Boothroyd (August 6-12).

The first SFEMS workshop took place in the summer of 1977. Since then it has expanded to five separate workshops extending over the entire summer season and located at the picturesque campus of Dominican College in San Rafael, California. New this year is an expanded Baroque Workshop, with a faculty including Marion Verbruggen, Philip Brett, and Mary Springfels.

The Canto Antiguo Workshop was known to a whole generation of ARS members as the Idyllwild Workshop, but last year it moved to a beautiful setting in Ojai, California. Canto Antiguo was one of the first recorder workshops to encourage its participants to play other early instruments-even establishing a collection of instruments for loan.

A feature of this workshop has always been a faculty drawn from all over the United States. Founding Director Shirley Robbins and her Codirectors Tom Axworthy and Ron Glass have designated this year's event a "Renaissance Festival in honor of LaNoue Davenport," to celebrate LaNoue's forty years of devoted teaching and playing in early music.
