SHELLEY GRUSKIN TO RECEIVE ARS DISTINGUISHED ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Shelley Gruskin, a past president of the American Recorder Society who is well-known for his important work as a performer and teacher, has been selected as the third recipient of the American Recorder Society Distinguished Achievement Award. The award will be presented by ARS Presi-



dent Constance Primus during the Boston Early Music Festival and Exhibition in June 1991. Previous awardees were Friedrich von Huene and Bernard Krainis.

Mr. Gruskin studied flute under Joseph Mariano at the Eastman School of Music, graduating in 1956. He performed one season with the Rochester Philharmonic and in 1957 with the NBC Opera Orchestra. At that point, he seriously considered giving up music as a profession, but was revitalized by his discovery of an old flute in a New York antique shop. He began studying early flutes and recorder in earnest and was a founding member, with LaNoue Davenport and Martha Bixler, of the Manhattan Recorder Consort, New

York's first professional recorder consort. He joined the New York Pro Musica under Noah Greenberg in 1961, continuing with that ensemble until 1974. Mr. Gruskin is regarded as a pioneer in early winds for his performances with that ensemble on Renaissance flutes, crumhorns, and rauschpfeifen. As a member of the Philidor Trio beginning in 1965, he is credited with being the first in America to use the 18th-century flute in concert performance. He recorded with these groups for Classic Editions, Decca, and Arcadia records, and he recorded the Brandenburg Concertos for the Columbia label.

Mr. Gruskin was elected as a Director of the American Recorder Society in 1980, and chosen President by the Board of Directors in September of that year. It was during Mr. Gruskin's term that the President's Appeal was instituted, which now enables the Society to provide supplemental services and carry out special projects.

Mr. Gruskin is a favorite workshop leader among ARS chapters and recorder societies throughout the U.S. and Canada. Since 1978, he has taught recorder and flute as artist-in-residence at the College of St. Scholastica in Duluth, Minnesota, where he is artistic director of the Center for Early Music and conductor of its orchestra. He has served on the faculties of Brooklyn College, Hartt College of Music, and the New York College of Music, which was among the first schools in the U.S. to integrate the study of recorder into the Bachelor of Music program.

LINSENBERG GIVES REGIONAL PREMIERE

Ezra Laderman's *Talkin'-Lovin'-Leavin'*, commissioned by the American Recorder Society to celebrate its 50th Anniversary in 1989 received its first "regional premiere" on December 6, 1990, in a performance by Judith Linsenberg with the Stanford String Quartet in Stanford's Dinkelspiel Auditorium.

The piece was played second on a program that included Mozart's Quartet in D Major, K. 575, Joaquin Turina's *La oración del torero*, Op. 34, and Dvorák's Quartet in F Major, Op. 96 ("American"). Part of the aim of the ARS in commissioning the work was to create a vehicle that would demonstrate the recorder as a credible instrument in a program of standard repertory.

Ms. Linsenberg, who holds the Soloist Diploma from the Vienna Academy of Music and a doctorate from Stanford, has performed extensively in this country and abroad with such ensembles as Musica Sacra, the Philharmonia Baroque, and the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra. Members of the Stanford String Quartet performing the piece were Susan Freier, violin, Bernard Zaslav, viola, Stephen Harrison, cello, and Phillip Levy, guest violin.

Another regional premiere will be given May 23, 1991, in Redpath Hall of McGill University, Montreal, Quebec, featuring Natalie Michaud with the McGill University Faculty String Quartet. Also presenting regional premieres will be John Tyson in Boston, Massachusetts, and Eva Legêne in Bloomington, Indiana. The regional premieres are supported in part with performance grants from the ARS.

The piece was given its world premiere March 9, 1990, by Michala Petri and the New World String Quartet at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City. Composer Ezra Laderman is dean of the School of Music of Yale University.

DIRECTOR'S CORNER - Alan G. Moore

In November, your president, Constance Primus and I had the pleasure of meeting and greeting many of you at the National Meeting of the American Orff-Schulwerk Association in Denver. We participated in a meeting with leaders of AOSA to explore ways in which each organization can support the other. Both organizations share many common goals. These stem directly from the philosophies shared by the guiding forces behind each organization—Erich Katz and Carl Orff. We had a very good meeting and will keep you posted on developments.

By now, all of you have received a letter from Mrs. Primus asking for your added support of ARS in the form of a contribution to the President's Appeal. In the past, only about 8 percent of you have responded; but these contributions have accounted for about 12 percent of our annual operating budget. Last year, special gifts made it possible for ARS to award two additional scholarships to ARS-endorsed summer workshops and acquire both duplicating and FAX machines and a second printer.

Having both machines in the office has enabled us to cut the marginal cost of commercial duplicating and FAXing by almost 80 percent (not to mention the savings in time); and, when necessary, we can run two printers at once. Your contributions have made it possible for ARS to keep its dues at the lowest possible rate. If half of you who have not responded in the past sent only \$5, ARS would have an additional \$9,000 with which to serve you better.

In order to let you know about forthcoming events of interest, we must know about them in time to include them in the Calendar of Events. The next deadline is March 15, 1991. Please send announcements

through next November to the ARS office. Chapter representatives have received a special form for calendar listings. If anyone wishes a copy, please contact the office.

One of the pleasures I had when I began working for ARS was hearing from some of you whom I had neither seen nor corresponded with in many years. One of these was Henry Schmidt. Henry and I shared an apartment during our first year of graduate study at Stanford. Henry was an accomplished recorder player who held a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship in the German Department and played in many of the early-music ensembles. According to a recent letter, Henry "professed German at Ohio State University for the past 20 years" and participated actively in the Columbus Chapter of ARS. Somehow, he managed to play two recorders at once.

Sadly, I learned recently that Henry passed away. Both ARS and the Columbus Chapter have lost a good friend. To his family and friends we send our deepest sympathies. We will miss you; but in a short lifetime, you made a big contribution.

On December 18th, I had the pleasure of hearing the young Mexican recorder virtuoso Horacio Franco in a concert of music by contemporary Mexican composers at the Pierpont Morgan Library. This concert was part of a large-scale cultural event—MEXICO, A Work of Art—sponsored by the Mexican government. Pete Rose, I understand, will have a full discussion of this concert in the next *American Recorder*.

We wish to thank all of you who sent holiday greetings to ARS and to wish you and all our members and friends a very healthy and prosperous New Year.

INTERLOCHEN BEGINS PROGRAM IN EARLY MUSIC

The Interlochen Arts Camp, well-known as an outstanding summer camp for accomplished high school musicians, will begin a new course of studies in Medieval and Renaissance music in the 1991 session, June 23-August 19.

Under the direction of Mark Cudek, Interlochen's Early Music Program will feature ensemble classes in both vocal and instrumental music. Several period instruments—lutes, recorders, crumhorns, viole da gamba—will be available for students enrolled in the program.

During the year, Mark Cudek is director of the Renaissance Ensemble at the Peabody Conservatory, artist-inresidence at the Walters Art Gallery, and instructor of guitar at Mt. St. Mary's College. ARS ARCHIVE ESTABLISHED AT UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO

Professor Karl Kroeger, music librarian at the University of Colorado at Boulder, announced recently that the Norlin Library Archives will house the American Recorder Society papers. The ARS Archive joins the Erich Katz Archive, housed in the American Music Research Center, also at the University of Colorado at Boulder.

According to Dr. William Kearns, director of the American Music Research Center, "having both the Erich Katz collection and the ARS archives here will provide excellent research opportunities for scholars interested in the history of the recorder movement in the United States."

The establishment of the ARS Archive at the University of Colorado at Boulder came about primarily through discussions among Martha Bixler, Constance Primus, and William Kearns when Ms. Bixler visited the Erich Katz Archive last June. She visited the Katz Archive to research material for her forthcoming history of the American Recorder Society.
