CELEBRATE NATIONAL PLAY-THE-RECORDER DAY

We are now making final plans for NATIONAL PLAY-THE-RECORDER DAY, March 28, 1992. Many chapters have responded positively and have sent us a list of local newspapers and radio stations to which we will send publicity about the events you are planning. However, many chapters have not yet responded. If you plan to participate, please let the ARS Office know your plans as soon as possible. We need at least two months in order to prepare and send publicity to the media and materials to the chapters.

We are pleased to welcome Lee Collins of Collins and Williams Historic Woodwinds and the Theodore Presser Company as Corporate Sponsors of National Play-the-Recorder Day. They join Magnamusic, the Zen-On Corporation, and Sweet Pipes as Corporate Sponsors.

As part of the activities, ARS will hold a raffle for some very nice prizes. Among the prizes is a \$100 certificate for recorder repair, voicing, tuning, etc., from Lee Collins of Collins and Williams Historic Woodwinds; ten quartz metronomes (Metrina 315) and 5 pocket digital metronomes (Metrina Multi 353) from the Zen-On Corporation; and three Dolmetsch plastic soprano recorders from the Theodore Presser Company. We plan to sell no more than 1,000 chances at \$5 per chance. The first 500 people who buy a chance will receive a plastic recorder ballpoint pen as a gift for their support of this raffle. You may purchase chances directly from the ARS Office or you may purchase chances through chapters. Chapters that sell chances will keep half of the price of each chance sold for their own use. We will send instructions for selling chances shortly. Chapters may sell chances even if they choose not to participate in NATIONAL PLAY-THE-RECORDER DAY.

1992 BOARD ELECTIONS

During the Winter and Spring of 1992, all ARS members will be asked to participate in the election process to select a Board of Directors to serve for four years, 1992-96. To begin this process, the Board appointed a Nominating Committee of seven Chapter Representatives led by A. Richard Phillips, 1637 Grand Avenue, Kalamazoo, MI 49006. According to the ARS By-Laws, there are two ways of becoming a candidate for the ARS Board. The first way is through the process of nomination by the Nominating Committee. Dick Phillips, Chairman, asks that all ARS members who wish to propose a candidate for nomination or who wish to be considered for nomination by the Nominating Committee should contact a member of the Nominating Committee by JANUARY 24, 1992. All those who have been proposed or asked to be considered for nomination will receive a biography and information form, which must be returned to Mr. Phillips in a timely manner. The Nominating Committee will then se-

lect its choices to be placed on the ballot. Anyone not receiving a nomination through the nominating process will receive information on nomination through petition.

The second way to be nominated as a candidate is through direct petition. Any ARS member may become a candidate for election to the Board of Directors by submitting to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee:

- 1. A petition signed by at least 10 members of the Society.
- 2. A statement of the nominee's qualifications for the post of Director.
- 3. A statement, signed by the nominee, expressing willingness to assume the responsibilities of a Director and to serve as a Director if elected.

Anyone interested in being nominated by petition or any group interested in nominating a candidate by petition is asked to contact Dick Phillips as soon as possible for the official petition, biography and information form, and statement of willingness to assume the responsibilities of a Director and to serve as a Director if elected.

Instructions will accompany all requests for petitions, etc., and all petitions must be returned by the date indicated in the instructions.

The official ballot and instructions for voting will be sent to each member in good standing shortly after April 15, 1992. Any member who does not receive an official ballot and instructions for voting by May 15, 1992, should contact the ARS Office immediately.
