WORKSHOPS AND SHOWCASE CONCERTS AT BOSTON EARLY MUSIC FESTIVAL

As part of the ARS presence at the Boston Early Music Festival, held this year at Harvard University, June 13-20, board member **Gene Murrow** and immediate Past President **Martha Bixler** organized two miniworkshops, one "for those who've never played anything" (but always wanted to play an instrument) and one "for those with some musical instrument experience." Each workshop attracted over forty people. During the week, twenty-eight people joined the ARS. Every new member received a recorder, method book, and new member package.

The organizers wish to thank everyone who helped with the workshops, including Leslie Kurtzberg and Bernice Chen, members of the Boston Chapter, who helped with registration, and the members of The Bleeker Consort (Debbie Segal, Ann Githler, Janie Schwab, and Julie Nelson), who helped lead the musical responses and shared their talents with those in attendance. Special thanks to Israel Stein, president of the Boston Recorder Society, for all his help and encouragement with this year's BEMF activities.

Based on the success of these workshops, the ARS hopes to sponsor several more. Presently, we are arranging for a supply of recorders and books and will have a training video available. If your chapter or consort wishes to hold an ARS mini-workshop for beginners, please contact the office for more information.

Thursday and Friday, June 17 and 18, a series of showcase recitals by ARS member recorderists was presented at the Swedenborg Chapel (see Tidings, AR). Organized by board member Valerie Horst and American Recorder editor Benjamin Dunham, the series of recitals attracted large audiences and set the tone for a superb festival. Thanks and congratulations to all the participants.

DIRECTOR'S CORNER

I hope everyone had a wonderful summer. I celebrated the beginning of the summer by meeting and greeting many of you at this year's Boston Early Music Festival. It was a very exhilarating experience. (See the report on BEMF on page one.)

Now to some business. The ARS has just finished a very successful year. In January we moved the office to Jackson, New Jersey. We have more room and will show a tremendous saving of more than \$6,000 in rent and utilities this year. This is money that will revert back to all members in the form of programs and services.

Membership is on the upswing. As I write this column, there are still about three weeks left in the ARS year, and final figures are not available. However, membership is running slightly ahead of last year, and this bodes well for the future of the ARS. In order to expand member services and programs, membership needs to increase every year. Many members give ARS memberships to friends and introduce them to the wonderful world of the recorder. If there is no chapter in your area, plan to start one. I will work closely with you and help in any way I can. Also, you should try to interest your local library in subscribing to *American Recorder*. Most community libraries will display literature and posters advertising your activities. Call or write me if you wish more information. I always enjoy talking to members and helping, if possible, with membership development. We have some programs that might help you develop a chapter.

Speaking of memberships, we need your help with a problem we are experiencing. Every year the office mails out about 2,500 first-renewal notices. Only about 1,000 of you respond to the first notice. Therefore, we need to send you a second notice. This second notice costs the ARS an additional \$705: \$435 in postage, \$150 in paper, envelopes, copy supplies, computer ribbons, etc., and \$120 in fees to hire people to fold, stuff, and stamp. Then, from this second renewal notice, only about half (750) respond, forcing us to spend another \$352.50 to send out a third and final notice. We hate to lose any member and try to give members every opportunity to respond. (Unfortunately, after three notices, we must drop you from active membership.) Please, in the future, do respond to our first renewal notice, even if you do not wish to renew. A sixty percent savings in second and third renewal notice costs could provide two to three more scholarships to summer workshops, or provide additional funds for membership development, and/or revert back to member services in other ways.

On a positive note, the new JRS CLASS PROGRAM FOR BE-GINNERS is ready for distribution. You may order your copy by sending a check for \$19.95 or providing the office with your Visa/Mastercard number and expiration date and charging your order. We have already distributed over fifty copies and expect this to be a popular item. So far all reviews have been very favorable.

Be sure to read the November *ARS Newsletter* for a report on the September Board Meeting in Seattle and information on any new programs adopted at this meeting. 1993-94 promises to continue the momentum begun this year and be even more exciting than the year just concluded.

MASTERCARD PROGRAM

As most members know, the ARS has its own Mastercard. MBNA America plans to call all ARS members who do not presently have an ARS Mastercard in late November/early December to explain the benefits and answer questions. Anyone who has instructed the ARS not to release his/her name to other organizations will not receive a telephone call from MBNA America. However, other members may object to receiving calls of this kind. Therefore, if you do not wish to receive a call explaining the benefits of carrying and using the ARS Mastercard, please notify the office before November 15.

For every member who agrees to receive a card (free for the first year), the ARS receives a small payment. Also, every time a member uses his/her card, the ARS receives a small payment. If only ten percent of ARS members agree to receive an ARS Mastercard and use it to pay for five purchases a month, the ARS will receive payments of over \$3,000 a year. This money will fund more member services and programs and help keep dues at the lowest possible level.

Some members may object to the ARS participating in this kind of program. However, during tough economic times, the ARS needs to maximize its revenue. This program promises to help the ARS bottom line, if members will support the program. Executive Director Alan Moore reports that he has used his card for ARS travel and other business related expenses and that he has had a most positive experience. On two occasions he has needed to call customer service and has always received prompt and courteous attention to his problems.

WINNER OF RSC ESSAY CONTEST ATTENDS PINEWOODS EARLY MUSIC WEEK

This year, **Kay Collins-Thompson** was the winner of an essay contest, sponsored by the Recorder Society of Connecticut, to award a summer workshop scholarship. She attended the Pinewoods Early Music Week, and her winning essay is printed here:

The purposes of the Recorder Society of Connecticut being quite broad and general, namely: "the enjoyment of recorder playing...with an emphasis on technique and interpretation," participation in a [recorder] workshop by any member would lend itself naturally to the enhancement of these objectives. Assuming that the strength of the group is derived by the energy brought to it by each individual participant, it would follow that what amplifies the musical growth of one member promotes the health and vigor of the Society as a whole.

...As a newcomer to the RSC, I have so far felt that I have received much more from the Saturday workshops than it has been possible for me to give back. Encouraged by the optimism of the members and our intrepid leader to return week after week, even if I can play only half the notes the first couple of times through the music, I sit unabtrusively in the back row, unsure fingers busily and earnestly trying to find the right notes.

Of my enjoyment of recorder playing there can be no doubt. The hours spent practicing attest to that. With the assistance of my patient teacher, Elise, progress *is* being made.

Participation in a workshop would be a thrilling experience for me, and I hope, be an additional means for me to progress from the pure enjoyment of playing to the advancement of technique and interpretation, both equally important elements of group playing.

RALPH TAYLOR, 89, EARLY EDITOR OF AMERICAN RECORDER

Ralph Taylor, who was editor of *American Recorder* in 1961, died June 24 at the age of 89. He was an active member of the American Recorder Society, and had taught recorder at New York University's Adult Education Department and directed the Instrumentae Anciens group.

Mr. Taylor was co-owner and manager of the Casswell-Massey apothecary business, which had been founded in 1752 in Newport, Rhode Island. He was known to entertain people with information about the prescriptions and cosmetics ordered by theatrical stars like Lillian Russell, Edwin Booth, and Sarah Bernhardt and historical figures like Edgar Allan Poe and George Washington.
