GAIL LITTLETON IS NEW ARS EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The board of directors of the American Recorder Society has chosen Gail Littleton, an arts administrator at Texas Tech University, as the organization's new executive director. Ms. Littleton will establish a head-



quarters office for the ARS in the Denver, Colorado, area.

Ms. Littleton was chosen after a fourmonth nationwide search campaign, headed by board member Nikolaus von Huene. Since 1989, she has been activities advisor for the University Center at Texas Tech in Lubbock, where she was previously publicity director for the Texas Tech School of Music. She also holds two degrees from Texas Tech: the Bachelor of Music Education, *magna cum laude*, and the Master of Music in Theory-Composition. She studed flute with Michael Stoune and composition with Ron Pellegrino and Mary Jeanne van Appledorn.

Gail comes to the ARS with a background in arts administration and public radio and as a professional performer on the flute and recorder. Over the next few weeks, both Gail and the ARS office will be moving to former on flute and recorder, playing Baroque flute with the Texas Tech Baroque Ensemble from 1985 to 1994 and forming her own recorder consort to play at Lubbock's Madrigal Dinner, an annual scholarship fund-raising event. She has performed with various new music ensembles and was the piccoloist of the Roswell (NM) Symphony Orchestra from 1983 to 1993.

In Lubbock, her civic activities included serving on the Mayor's Task Force on Arts, Culture and Entertainment of the Llano Estacado, the board of directors of the Lubbock NPR-affiliate KOHM-FM, and the advisory council of the Lubbock Arts Alliance. She was also active with the annual Lubbock Arts Festival, serving as co-chairman of the Festival's performing arts division in 1986. Her other volunteer activities have included hosting a bi-weekly public affairs and classical music radio show on KOHM-FM.

In addition to restoring antique *music* to its original sound, she also enjoys acquiring and restoring antique furniture and collectibles, as well as the outdoor activities of skiing and backpacking.

Several important ARS projects are moving forward. For example, the final draft of the Junior Recorder Society Club

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
DIRECTOR'S CORNER

EDUCATION NOTES

Although it now costs \$100 to take the Level III examination, there is a new graduated fee schedule for retaking any portion of the examination. The fee for retaking one of the first three sections (Scales and Arpeggios, Ear Training, or Sight-Reading) is \$60, while retaking two sections will cost \$80. If it is necessary to retake either the Repertoire section or all of the other three sections, the cost will be the full \$100.

When an examination of any level is being graded by the ARS and the examinee chooses to play a piece that is not on the Music List for that level, the published music (no photocopies allowed) for that choice must be sent to the Education Committee with the tape and other examination materials.

ACTIVE RECRUITMENT OF NEW MEMBERS BENEFITS BOTH CHAPTERS AND ARS

Membership development is an important priority of the American Recorder Society this year. An inflow of new members creates vitality at all levels. New members can bring enthusiasm and new skills to chapters, providing stimulation for long-time members. A larger national membership also creates a larger market for instrument makers, music publishers, teachers, and workshops, without whom our lives would be poorer (though our wallets perhaps thicker!). And the more members there are, the larger the available financial resources, allowing chapters and the ARS alike to fund exciting educational and musical programs.

Many chapters would like to enlarge their membership, but are not clear where to start or what to do. The idea is to focus on strengths, not weaknesses, and to design your membership efforts specifically for your community. Make sure that your meetings have a topic that will be attractive to a larger number of people. Even small chapters can focus on a period or style of music each meeting, or invite in a speaker/leader from the local college music department, or show a brief video about history and music, or use one of the ARS Information Booklets as a subject.

While most chapters *do* have good programs (ideally, the kind that will cause people to come out in the snow on a cold winter night or skip a barbecue at the beach in spring or summer), the general public often does not know about them. The best approach is to make one person in your chapter responsible for sending a press release for each program to several local newspapers. Soon, the papers will count on your material to fill their community events space. This kind of effort can typically bring one or two potential members to each meeting. Radio announcements or community cable TV listings may be available to you. Special events like workshops with out-of-town leaders and the outreach concerts presented during National Play-the-Recorder Month may generate feature stories and a burst of new members.

Be prepared! If absolute beginners show up on your doorstep, make sure you have a program to make them feel welcome, either as part of your regular meetings, or through special instructional classes, sponsored or recommended by your chapter. Maybe try a "buddy system" to see that newcomers are introduced around.

In the next few weeks, Chapter Reps will receive additional brochures to use for membership development. Be sure to sign up your new members for the ARS on the Chapter Rebate form, so that your chapter will receive the benefit of your efforts in a tangible way. Remember, rebates cannot be given unless this form is used. *Full membership dues should be paid to the ARS by the chapter*.

Of course, renewal members are just as important as new members. We hope that as many members as possible will use the membership coupon in *American Recorder* for renewing, since this eliminates the need for a reminder letter. Renewal dates are now being printed on your *American Recorder* mailing labels, right after your membership number (for example, 9502 means February 1995). The ARS is also especially grateful to the Treasurer or Chapter Rep of each chapter who has taken upon himself or herself the task of collecting renewals.
