AMERICAN RECORDER SOCIETY MEMBERS' LIBRARY EDITIONS

The Members' Library series issued three editions in 1993-94: a reprint of Erich Katz's *New Rounds on Old Rhymes* in September, 1993; Ann McKinley's *Three Bantam Ballads* in March, 1994, and Stephan Chandler's *Different Quips* in May, 1994. The editions are published by the ARS for its members, and individual issues are received by the membership with *American Recorder*. Members' Library editions are financed by the Erich Katz Memorial Fund.

We are very much pleased by the quantity and quality of the music that has been offered for publication in this series. Although we have enough backlog to keep us going until the fall of 1996, we are still accepting works for recorder ensemble. Music submitted must fit the six-page format (four pages of music), and must be on an intermediate to high-intermediate level. We are particularly interested in original music, but we publish arrangements, too. Coming up are arrangements of both Bach and Brahms.

In November 1994 we will publish more of Chandler's delightful *Quips* for recorders (under a new title: *Other Quips*) and in the Spring of 1995 we will publish three of Carolyn Peskin's *Cleveland Scenes*—tiny musical landscapes of various locations in the composer's home town. These pieces, under a different title, won an Honorable Mention in the Erich Katz Composition Competition of 1987.

We are grateful to the Erich Katz Fund for its support, to Winifred Jaeger for the valuable help received in the preparation of the Katz *Rhymes*, to Ken Andresen, whose attractive settings enhance the final editions of this music, and to our reading committee, Judith Wink, Henry Zehner, and Michael Zumoff, without whose skills we would be hard put to evaluate the music submitted.

Finally, we must report two typographical errors in the last two editions. In the first of the *Bantam Ballads*, "Estampie," there should be a double bar at the end of measure 36 to mark the end of the second punctum; in the first piece of *Different Quips*, "Trainride," there should be an F‡ in the key signature of the second bass part. We hope that members will write these corrections in their own copies.

I hope the summer afforded you some opportunities for meeting new musical friends as I did during these two events. In November, if any of you plan to attend the American Orff-Schulwerk Association convention in Philadelphia, I will be among you there and would love to visit with you. Look for me at recorder sessions!

Since I last wrote to you in the May Newsletter, there is an additional face in the office (or, perhaps from your perspective, a new voice on the telephone). She is Karen Voigt, who is primarily keeping your membership records up to date and accurate. Karen is a member of the ARS Denver Chapter and is also active as a flutist with the Denver Concert Band. It has been a great help to have her in the office part-time each week (usually Monday-Thursday 9 a.m.-2 p.m. Mountain time, in case you want to call Karen).

You will also soon see some familiar ARS faces wearing different hats as your current officers step down and other Board members assume their positions later this month. Many thanks to Connie Primus, Valerie Horst, Gene Murrow and Scott Paterson. They were at the helm during a period of great change for the ARS and kept things running on an even keel. Special thanks are also due to those who provided support to these officers, especially Bob Primus and Susan Murrow who helped at two ends of our move from New Jersey to Colorado.

Karen and I are working to get all records current in the office so that the 1995 Directory can go to press in November and be mailed out to you in December. I mentioned in passing in the last Newsletter the possibility that e-mail addresses would be listed in the directory and immediately started getting responses that indicated that some of you liked the idea. We are working on a format which will include e-mail addresses, so let us know by the end of September that you want to be listed. Also please let us know if you would like to be included in the lists of teachers or consorts which are part of the Directory. And, of course, if you have moved, please let us know your current address and phone number. (Note: The ARS e-mail address is now listed as part of our masthead information in American Recorder. Another reminder: your prompt renewals translate to more money for ARS scholarships and for increased member services. Understandably, some members were confused or even frustrated during our move to Colorado and allowed their memberships to lapse. Karen, volunteers from the Denver chapter, and I spent a portion of the summer (as well as a sizeable chunk of postage) mailing out letters to contact those members and ask them to rejoin ARS. We would enlist your support to encourage your friends who are not presently ARS members to join/rejoin, and also your help by renewing promptly yourself. Your renewal date is coded on the address label for this publication: for example, 9409 means your renewal date is September 1994.

One way we are spending money for increased services is through the chapter rebate program. Here is your chance for chapters to receive \$10 for each brand new ARS member (\$5 for each new student member) recruited. This is a good way to boost your membership and your treasury simultaneously. What better way to spend your money than to help in two areas vital to the life of your chapter?

The coming year promises to be a busy and exciting one. I am already thinking ahead to National Play-the-Recorder Month in March 1995, and would encourage you to begin plans to participate. Some activities might require you to begin immediately in order to reap full benefits. For example, you might consider starting a new chapter now (only 10 ARS members are required) and scheduling your first new membership drive for March. Or you might aim to have performances polished for presentation at banks, churches, malls, etc., during March in order to get more exposure for an existing chapter or consort. Or perhaps you might videotape group playing sessions during your meetings and make the video available to chapter members willing to introduce the video as a program for local civic groups. The truly ambitious could offer an introductory group lesson.

I hope that you are as excited about beginning a new year of activities as I am. Please feel free to call me with your ideas and suggestions, or jot them in a letter. The ARS is your means for having a voice in the early music movement, and we always want to know your opinions and needs.

QUICK'S PICNIC MUSIC AVAILABLE FROM ARS

Jeffrey Quick's *Picnic Music* won the 1992 (the last) Erich Katz Memorial Fund Composition Contest and was published by the ARS in January 1994. Copies of the published edition were sent gratis to chapter representatives with permission to make copies for their members. Non-chapter members and those who would like further copies of the music may now order directly from the ARS. The price per copy is \$3.00, plus \$2 for postage and handling.

Picnic Music is for recorder quartet (SATB). It has three movements. The first, in sonata form, is untitled, but reflects the overall title. The second is "Cage is Dead," a ricercar based on the letters C A G E S(Eb) D E A D. This humorous tribute includes a "cantus firmus" from Cage's silent 4'33", and a bit of the Dies Irae. The third movement is called "The Humours of Tremont-Reel," a parody of similar titles in O'Neill's Music of Ireland.
