AN EVENT-FULL MARCH FOR PLAY-THE-RECORDER MONTH

March 1995 marks the third annual Play-the-Recorder Month, which grew out of National Play-the-Recorder Day on March 28, 1992. This is our opportunity to have a widespread (perhaps international!) effort to draw attention to activities relating to the recorder. We are es-

pecially interested in focusing on ways to interest our youth in playing the recorder. Suggestions for events include:

- Form a buddy system where an experienced player helps a new player gain skills, confidence and enjoyment from playing recorder. This could involve anything from playing duets together to working before a chapter meeting on some of the music to be played.
- Contact the appropriate school administrator or teacher volunteering your assistance for recorder classes or a Junior Recorder Society Club. In a recent chapter newsletter, Ernie Wright of the Upper Valley Early Music Society suggested this as a good way to improve or even start ensemble playing in our schools.
- Don't forget day-care centers as another possible place to reach youngsters.
- Schedule any performances that you can, preferably using public outlets like libraries, bookstores, public school assemblies, or TV and radio. Use these performances to invite newcomers to a special meeting which might include a demonstration of the recorder family, a beginning lesson and refreshments.
- Dick Payne of the Kalamazoo Recorder Players wrote that they involved interested audience members in a beginner's lesson during an arts festival concert. The finale of the lesson was a group performance of "Camptown Races" in which the beginners played the "doo-dahs."
- Call any local sympathetic radio stations (especially classical or NPR stations) to encourage them to play recorder music or at least Renaissance music as part of the month's festivities. Have a person available who is willing to be interviewed about the recorder and about local early music activities.
- Encourage a science teacher to have students make a simple recorder by

Chapter Leadership Session at BEMF

The ARS Chapter Committee announces a Leadership Lunch at the next Boston Early Music Festival, to take place Saturday, June 18, from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. at the ARS Festival Headquarters in the Swedenborg Church near the Boston Common. All chapters are urged to send an officer or member to this meeting. Executive Director Gail Littleton, Chapter Committee Chair Jack Anderson (Pittsburgh Chapter), and ARS President Gene Murrow will preside.

The meeting will give ARS leaders at the local and national levels a chance to get to know one another and to hold a focused discussion about the major problems and concerns of chapters. We hope chapter officers will also share their creative solutions and the secrets of their success. Afterward there will be an article in the Newsletter summarizing the meeting, so that chapters unable to send a representative may benefit as well. The national leaders expect to learn everything they can from you and to develop ideas on shaping ARS policy and programs to better serve chapters.

If you wish, come earlier and watch—or help out—as Gene Murrow and Martha Bixler run their sessions for total beginners who don't read music (9:00 a.m.) and total beginners who do read music (10:30 a.m.). If your chapter needs new members but doesn't know how to go about getting them, these sessions by two top professionals may inspire you.

Other ARS events planned for BEMF include a workshop in jazz music for recorder (Wednesday, June 14), two full days of back-to-back recitals (Thursday and Friday, June 15 and 12), a concert of jazz and other popular-style music for recorder, and a gala reception for ARS members and friends. BEMF is planning to announce a major Festival recital by a recorderist on Friday or Saturday evening—more details in the March AR.

• Organize a recorder festival, especially one in which young recorder players perform with and for each other. Or include groups of young recorder players in other scheduled performances. The Princeton chapter, participating this year for the first time in Play-the-Recorder Month, has scheduled as many as ten groups to play over a two-hour period at a local bookstore. Included is one consort with young recorder players.

Let the ARS office know as soon as possible what events you plan to sponsor, so that your events can be included in the March *Newsletter*. And, of course, send us a follow-up when the events are over so we know how they went!

Play-the Recorder Month Materials Available

Each chapter will receive a sample publicity packet for use in conjunction with events held during March.

Ten copies of the official Play-the-Recorder Month poster, using a black-and-white version of Stephen Schudlich's cover design from the November *American Recorder*, will also be sent to each chapter and Junior Recorder Society club, plus several copies to each consort affiliate and business member. Any member may request additional copies from the ARS office.

The official poster will also invite "children of all ages" to participate in a coloring contest by colorizing the black-and-white artwork on the poster. Additional copies of the poster may be made, and an 8-1/2"x11" version will be published in the March *American Recorder*, along with the contest rules.

T-shirts, featuring Schudlich's design in black and

white on a kelly green heavyweight cotton shirt, may be purchased by contacting the ARS before February 1. Prices are \$16.50 for adult sizes (S/M/L/XL) and \$13.50 for youth sizes (S=6-8, M=10-12, L=14-16). Prices include shipping and handling.
