PLAY-THE-RECORDER MONTH ACTIVITIES DEMONSTRATE TO ADULTS AND STUDENTS THE JOYS OF PLAYING RECORDER

While all the news of Play-the-Recorder Month activities is not yet in, we are able to report on a few of the outstanding public events that promoted the recorder to the general public.

The Fall River (MA) Fipple Fluters presented a program at the Fall River Public Library on March 25. Under the direction of Judith Conrad, Paul and Diana Ukleja, Eugenia Field, Marian Ryall, Laura Conrad, Elsie MacNeill, Helen Conrad, Viola Gay, and Jerry Bellows played a mixture of English and Continental Renaissance secular tunes, as well as Andrew Charleton's Whimsical Duos and an arrangement of Henry C. Work's "Grandfather's Clock."

Betty Parker of the Santa Fe Recorder Society reports celebrating Play-the-Recorder Month "all month!" One weekend was spent participating in a joint workshop with the Tucson Recorder Society. On March 11, to encourage younger players in the Santa Fe area, the Santa Fe Junior Recorder Society produced a 40-minute radio program about musical styles. Later in the month, on March 29, Society member Phil Freed joined with the Ensemble Ocarina Nagoya in a program for recorders and ocarinas that was punctuated with a number of "commercials" for ARS. The previous evening's gala Workshop and Potluck Concert featured four members of the Ensemble Ocarina Nagoya, led by ARS members Itsumi Kato and Michiki Takahashi. Itsumi, who is the director of childhood education at the University of Nagoya, Japan, furnished clay ocarinas from Japan for the participants of the workshop. During the potluck dinner, which was ornamented by an edible black-bean recorder, a cheer was raised for Kitty Doe, who was attracted to the recorder during the first ARS "National Play-the-Recorder Day" in 1992 and passed her Level I exam during March.

The Muskegon (MI) Recorder Players (formerly the Muskegon Baroque Recorder Ensemble) and the Kalamazoo Players used the guest appearance of recorderist Aldo Abreu with the West Shore Symphony on March 10-11 to promote the recorder. Yamaha set up a complete display of recorders in the lobby, and Marie Blankenship's quartet from the Kalamazoo

members performed in costume at the annual Renaissance Fair at Vizcaya, the famous imitation Italian Renaissance palazzo.

Dallas-area residents were treated to a delightful evening (March 25) of music from Tielman Susato's *Danserye of 1551*, performed by **Earthly Pleasures**, one of the oldest continuing early music groups in Dallas. David and Susan Barton, founders of the group, alternated sung versions of songs by Claude de Sermisy, Josquin des Prez, and Clement Janequin with their treatment in Susato.

On March 26, twelve students of Gorge Leggiero gave a concert at the Cleveland Music School Settlement. Mr. Leggiero invited all Greater Cleveland ARS and Cleveland Recorder Club members to participate by playing in his newly formed Recorder Band. On March 5 in Manhattan Beach, California, and on March 11 in Costa Mesa California, the La Mer Consort, a group of 34 recorder players doubling on other early instruments, Elizabeth Zuehlke, conduc-

tor, offered performances in honor of Play-the-Recorder Month. Among the "five centuries of music" performed was a 1994 piece, *Twelve Tone Quartet in Canon* by Allan Valencia, a member of the ensemble.

The Park View Recorder Ensemble, under the direction of Elaine Clancy, and the Jane Addams Choir Chimes joined forces on March 9 at the Park View School in Morton Grove, Illinois, to call attention to the coincidence of Play-the-Recorder Month and Music in Our Schools Month. The music at this third annual joint concert ranged from Dufay to Bartok.

"Play the Recorder Day" in Montreal was set as March 18, when several recorder ensembles from Ars Musica Montreal entertained shoppers at the Course Mont Royal. Two playing sessions for the public, directed by Tim Walsh and Shirley Cahn, attracted enthusiastic recorder players, from nine-year-old students to pensioners, and many of them signed up for the remainder of the season. The event was organized by Mary McCutcheon. Another mall concert was held March 18 in the Balston Common in the Washington, D.C., area by the members of the Northern Virginia Recorder Society.

More than 500 children at the Gateway School in Santa Cruz, California, were treated March 6 to performances by Monterey Bay Recorder Society's Ensemble Virelai—Curt Bowman, Jane Hancock, Ron and Lorrie Emery, Kat Macfarlane, Priscilla Winslow, and Carolyn Woolston.

Three events to celebrate P-t-RM were scheduled by the Upper Valley Early Music Society: two were for children on March 24 in the Central Vermont Schools. The third was a public performance on March 19 at the Hanover Co-op in Hanover, New Hampshire. Among the performers were Dot Swayze, Phoebe Sheres, Will Wright, members of the Pinneo-Hill Players, and students of Dot Swayze.

The Tattered Cover Bookstore in Cherry Creek (March 11) and the Colorado State Museum (March 25) were the sites of the Denver Chapter's P-t-RM activities. The performers included Marilyn Davidson, Nancy Fey, Diane Potter, Elaine Granata, Lisa McInnis, Judy Miller, Daniel Soussan, Bill Conklin, and Susan Wilcox.

VIRGIN CLASSICS TO RELEASE LINSENBERG DISC OF BACH

Judith Linsenberg's recording of Bach organ trio sonatas in arrangements for recorder, violin, and continuo will be released by Virgin Classics in February 1996. The recording was produced with support from the 1991 ARS Recording Grant. Heard on the disc with Ms. Linsenberg are Elizabeth Blumenstock, violin, Elisabeth LeGuin, cello, and Edward Parmentier, harpsichord. The disc also includes a trio sonata version of Bach's Amajor flute sonata, BWV 1032.

COMPOSITION COMPETITION FOR RECORDER QUIRE*

A prize of \$3,000 is being offered for a composition seven to ten minutes in length with independent parts for 24 recorders. The competition is sponsored by George and Norah Payne as a gift for the Washington Recorder Society. Mr Payne was a charter member of the Society in 1958 and served as its president from 1976 to 1987.

Since the piece is intended for performance by amateur recorder groups, different levels of ability must be assumed—a reasonable balance would be six parts for lower intermediates, twelve for upper intermediates (i.e., players of average ability), and not more than six parts for advanced players. No parts, however, should require a professional or virtuoso standard. Entries must be original unpublished compositions, but may be based on folk or traditional tunes, as, for example, in the form of a theme and variations or a fantasia. A score and set of 24 parts, clearly legible and suitable for performance, must be submitted by December 1, 1995. Entries must be anonymous and will be judged on their suitability for the intended purpose, which includes being fun to play.

*Quire: 1. A set of 24 (as in a quire of paper); and 2. *Archaic spelling of "choir,"* a group of instruments of the same class, or of players on them.
