STUDY SCHOLARSHIPS

The ARS will again award Andrew Acs Scholarships, up to full tuition, to support recorder players attending summer workshops. Please contact the ARS office now for details and application forms. Applications must be received by **April 1** in order to be considered.

The Jennifer Wedgwood Lehmann Scholarship, established by the Princeton (NJ) Recorder Society on behalf of the ARS, is also available to provide assistance for a deserving recorder player to attend either a weekend or summer workshop. Those interested in applying for a Lehmann award should also contact the ARS office for an application and submit it at least two months before funding is needed.

PLAY-THE-RECORDER MONTH: **JUST AROUND THE CORNER IN MARCH**

March 1996 is the fourth annual Play-the-Recorder Month! It has become the opportunity to have an international effort to draw attention to activities involving the recorder.

To get the most return from your activities, consider having one kickoff event around which to focus your attention. Since the month-long ac-

tivity grew out of the first Playthe-Recorder Day in 1992, some chapters still find it most feasible to focus on one day. Look for ways you can participate by creating your own event, or perhaps take advantage of a an existing local opportunity for a focus event (for example, the Seattle concert on March 1 by Marion Verbruggen provides an ideal kick-off).

A sample publicity packet has been mailed to all chapter representatives for use in conjunction with March events. Included are fill-in-the-blank formats for news releases and public service announcements. Any member may receive a free packet from the ARS office.

Please inform the ARS office no later than January 31 what activities you plan to sponsor for Play-the-Recorder Month so that your events will be included in the March ARS Newsletter. And, of course, send a followup when the events are over so all will know how they went!

Chapter member and amateur rag pianist Ken Woodside took "Pickles and Peppers" home to show his guest from Germany, composer Laurie G. Alberts. She was so taken with the idea of a recorder rag that she returned to Germany and wrote a rag for her Miami friends.

Her "Poinciana Rag," so named because rag-master Scott Joplin loved flowers and because the poinciana blooms prolifically in southern Florida, was first played at a Miami chapter meeting during Play-the-Recorder
