A statement of the nominee's qualifications for the post of Director. 3. A statement, signed by the nominee, expressing willingness to assume the responsibilities of a Director and to serve as a Director if elected.

PLAY-THE-RECORDER MONTH: A WORK IN PROGRESS

It's the fourth annual Play-the-Recorder Month! Preliminary reports indicate a variety of activities happening everywhere:

- The Princeton (NJ) Encore Bookstore will host a performance by members of the Princeton Recorder Society, a repeat of last year's successful event.
- The Arte-facts from the Denver (CO) Chapter plan to play at the Colorado History Museum, another frequent host of musical events.
- Greater Cleveland (OH) Chapter will offer a four-hour recorder
 marathon involving recorders and other instruments at Pavillion Mall. Officers will be on hand to distribute literature and answer questions. Presented to tie in with Cleveland's bicentennial celebration, selections include music that might have been heard in 1796, especially music from
 New England. Cleveland was first part of the Western Reserve, territory
 belonging to Connecticut, and its settlers were New Englanders.
- A tailor-made event will be hosted by the San Francisco Early Music Society, which will have a one-day recorder workshop to benefit the SFEMS Summer Recorder Workshop scholarship fund.
- Greenblatt and Seay, a duo teaching and performing out of The Old Schoolhouse in Avoca, Nebraska, has scheduled a special concert featuring its Ancient Music Ensemble, comprised mostly of recorders.
- The Fall River (MA) Fipple Fluters have scheduled two events. The first, at the Fall River Public Library, will include the "Blues in F" recently published in American Recorder. The second, involving recorders and clavichord, will be hosted by the Unitarian Society.
- Two special services at churches in Hingham, Massachusetts, and Rutland, Vermont, will be enriched by a program of early music offered by the Performance Seminar Consort from the Boston (MA) Chapter.

Since the month-long activity grew out of the first Play-the-Recorder Day in 1992, many members have organized events big and small. Many find it most feasible to focus on one day. You still have time to participate! For a free publicity packet including posters, call the ARS office.

And please send reports of your Play-the-Recorder Month activities soon after they are held to the ARS office so all will know how they went. Ideas based on past successes will continue to be shared in future *Newsletters*.

PHONE MEETING HELD BY ARS BOARD

For the second time in its history, the Board of the American Recorder Society met by telephone conference call, on Saturday, February 10, 1996. Once again, the experience of compressing a weekend's activity into a four-hour meeting (prepared by conference call meetings of the Executive Committee and extensive e-mail communication) was found to be beneficial for the focus it brought to the proceedings.

The true preparation for this meeting was done at the September Board meeting, at which time a number of initiatives were set in motion in order to improve communications with the chapters and members. Most of these initiatives are progressing satisfactorily, especially considering the imminent purchase of up-to-date computer equipment for the ARS office. The new equipment will allow for an ARS page on the World Wide Web and for enhanced desktop publishing capabilities, making possible in-house produc-

The discussion kept drifting into past tense; I kept wishing it wouldn't. Driving home from the office after the February teleconference meeting of the ARS Board, I remembered when I had felt this way before: when my student volunteers at Texas Tech University were about to graduate and go off into the world. We made promises to keep in touch. But inevitably, some of them moved off to oil jobs in Abu Dhabi or home to Malaysia or Senegal, and I eventually stopped hearing from them.

Having identified the sensation, I relaxed: different group, different situation. None of the current Board members is about to move to a different time zone, much less another continent. These are people who have served the ARS unselfishly and who will continue to do so, whether they are on the Board or not. I'll be able to keep up with them, if not through regular personal contact, at least through chapter newsletters and reunions at places like the Berkeley Festival. Perhaps when circumstances change or when those who can't run for the Board are again eligible, they will once more serve as Board members.

It all relates to the word "society," which our magazine editor chose as a theme for the January issue of *American Recorder*. Granted, our members are too spread out geographically to all have companions with whom to play recorder. But we seek a way to come together for our common interest; and if we can't be there in person, at least we can feel connected because others in our Society were there for us.

Look at the list of your Board members on page 2 of *American Recorder*. Look at the list in this *Newsletter* of those nominated to take their place in September. Regardless of whether they are on the Board, these are people who are there for you.

About those former students: some of them are still very good friends, perhaps life-long. I keep up with them, one way or another. I get reports on their Army careers and theater activities, photos of their children. We talk on the phone when writing isn't enough. And if I'm ever in the neighborhood, I'm going to cash in on that standing invitation to visit Abu Dhabi.

tion of newsletters and other publications. The Board reflected on its term in office, during which time new efficiencies were brought to the Society and a number of farreaching initiatives were implemented, and it planned carefully so as to make the transition to the new Board as smooth as possible. Several important proposals to be put to the members for streamlining the By-Laws were approved, and a provisional budget was approved for the 1996-97 fiscal year. Board members unanimously expressed their sense of pride in the ARS and their desire to continue serving the Society actively up to the actual change-over to the new Board in September.

ARS CHAPTER GRANT

The Monterey Bay (CA) Recorder Society has received a chapter grant from the ARS Chapters and Consorts Committee, according to chair Jack Anderson. Two other chapters are submitting additional information to be evaluated by the committee for possible later awards. All applicant chapters requested support for spring projects.

The grant to MBRS underwrites the continuation of an outreach program for adult beginning recorder players. They are offered free group instruction and materials by MBRS member Mary Zweig. The goal is to develop skills so that the beginners feel comfortable participating in MBRS chapter meetings; five have already made that transition.

The next grant deadline is May 15 for fall 1996 projects. Chapter grant applications have been mailed directly to chapter representatives. Please call the ARS office if an application is not received.

COMPUTER CHALLENGE

The ARS Board recently authorized buying a new computer and embarked on a special one-on-one fundraising drive to pay for it. Several individuals have responded, in addition to their President's Appeal donations.

The Denver (CO) Chapter responded by challenging other chapters to collect donations from their members and match them with chapter funds. Denver officers pointed out that the new equipment will benefit all members, and that even small donations will mount up quickly when doubled by the chapter. Immediately after the challenge was issued, Denver officers collected \$75 plus a pledge for \$100, all to be matched. Denver members were given until the April 27 workshop to contribute.

RENEW OR CHANGE YOUR ADDRESS PROMPTLY TO RECEIVE YOUR BALLOT

With ARS Board elections just around the corner, now is the time to renew your membership promptly. Only ARS members in good standing whose renewals or new memberships are processed by **April** 15 will receive ballots.

A quick review of the renewal process:

- A single reminder letter is sent to all members a month before each member's due date. There are two versions of the letter: one for chapter members, and one for those not showing chapter affiliation. A chapter member who receives a renewal letter should prepare to pay at the next chapter meeting. If the chapter has already collected ARS dues, receipt of that letter by the member is a sign that dues have not yet been forwarded to the ARS office; members for whom this is the case should immediately check with their chapter membership officers.
- Any member may elect to pay dues directly to the ARS office, whether affiliated with a chapter or not. A member may also pay before the due date using the form printed in *American Recorder*. If a member renews a month before the due date (printed on the magazine mailing label), no renewal letter is sent.
- If renewal is not received by the first of the month before the next issue of American Recorder, the lapsed member is mailed a courtesy issue of the magazine along with a pink flysheet saying that membership has expired. For instance, anyone who should have renewed in January is reading this American Recorder as a courtesy.

Equally as important as renewing promptly is informing the ARS office of any change of address. As many as 60 extra copies of each American Recorder are mailed by first class postage, most of which are replacement copies sent to members who have moved. While it is not always possible to report a change of address in time to insure that American Recorder is mailed via the usual second class method to the correct address, please let the ARS office know as soon as you have new mailing information. With second class mail neither forwarded nor returned, and with each address change reported by the U.S.P.S. costing \$.50, each misdirected magazine represents well over double the normal cost to the ARS.

BERKELEY FESTIVAL UPDATE

Information is currently being compiled by the ARS Special Events Committee about recorder events during the Berkeley Festival, June 2-9, in California. Please let the ARS office know by March 19 if you plan to perform. All known events will be printed in the May issue of *American Recorder*.

Professional recorder players have been mailed information about performing on the ARS Great Recorder Relay, a set of mini-recitals showcasing professional recorderists. If you do not receive information about volunteering your artistic talents for this event, please call the ARS office. Applications are due back to the ARS office by March 19, after which a balanced program showing the recorder in its many guises will be assembled by the committee.

Many talents are needed to coordinate and work on the various ARS events to be held during the Berkeley Festival. Among many tasks, volunteers are needed to:

- Answer questions in the ARS booth (10 minutes to two hours appreciated);
- Serve as host for an event or session, including distributing programs or handouts, changing stage set-up (especially during the Recorder Relay), clearing the space after the event (a vehicle for harpsichord-moving is a definite plus, but not a requirement);
- Miscellaneous errands, from making photocopies to taking ARS brochures to remote events;
 - Reporting on various events for American Recorder.

Volunteering to help out at Berkeley is an excellent way to get to know fellow recorder players while working with them, and is much appreciated by the ARS. If you plan to attend the Berkeley Festival and are willing to pitch in, please call the ARS office.
