PLAY-THE-RECORDER MONTH ACTIVITIES INTRODUCE NEW AUDIENCES TO THE JOYS OF PLAYING RECORDER

Chapters from throughout the Continental U.S. A. and the Pacific sponsored innovative outreach activities during the fourth annual Play-the-Recorder Month in March, Here's a sampling:

• Guam Recorder Consort was heard March 7 on a KPRG broadcast in Guam and the Mariannas Islands (and because of arcing radio frequencies, in Siberia, and Antarctica). Co-host of the station's weekly "Airing the Arts" program (and Consort director) Cynthia B. Sajnovsky scheduled recorder music all during March in celebration. Other members of the Consort are Susan Ham, Sally Reidy, and Susan Salas.

• Kalamazoo Recorder Players (MI) celebrated P-t-RM along with Music in Our Schools Month by going back to sixth grade. A recorder quartet consisting of Marie Blankenship, Carolina Carpenter, Julianne Kelly and Paula Walker presented four performances to 200 sixth graders at Paw Paw Middle School.

• Ithaca-Fingerlakes Chapter (NY) hosted a workshop with Steve Rosenberg. The event also marked the return of chapter representative Marsha Evans, currently on leave from the chapter while attending the College of Charleston. Earlier in the month, eight adults and three children also made the 600-mile round trip to the 28th Annual Long Island Recorder Workshop.

• Moss Bay Chapter (WA) had to delay their 16th annual Spring Meet, usually held during P-t-RM, until

HIGHLAND PARK WINS CHAPTER GRANT; ITS MUSIC DIRECTOR RECEIVES DEMARSH

The ARS chapter committee is pleased to annouce the awarding of its second 1995-96 grant, following receipt of supporting information. Committee chair Jack Anderson reports that the recipient is the **Highland Park (NJ) Recorder Society**.

In addition to the grant, Highland Park music director **Robert Butts** received the DeMarsh Award to support his research into, and composition of a madrigal for recorders and strings, slated to premiere on the chamber orchestra performance supported by the chapter grant. The DeMarsh Fund, set up by the friends of the late Margaret S. DeMarsh, is used to support scholarships to workshops as well as grants for activities that add to the current understanding of the recorder and its music. Applications for this award are accepted at any time, but should be submitted at least two months before funding is needed.

The next **chapter grant deadline is May 15** for innovative projects set to occur during fall 1996. Please see your chapter representative or call the ARS office for an application.

April due to church unavailability. The all-day event is attended by 25-30 players from the Puget Sound area and elsewhere who enjoy six hours of recorder playing under three different conductors.

• Upper Valley Early Music Society (NH/VT) did their share by offering three programs in a week: twin sisters Dot Swayze and Phoebe Sheres gave two school performances as "Duo Gemini," and two other groups played at two area malls on two Saturdays. (One enthusiastic mall listener picked up a brochure and later picked up the phone to call the ARS office and join!)

• Worcester Hills Recorder Society (MA) had 30 people participate in its inaugural event, its first annual workshop at which ARS president Gene Murrow was guest teacher as well as performer on recorder, concertina and percussion. Other chapter members joined him on the final "recorder sampler" concert, entitled "Revel in the Cheerful Spring."

• Greater Cleveland Chapter (OH) had 34 participants in its Recorder Marathon: 20 students and faculty from the Cleveland Music School Settlement, as well as the North Coast Renaissance Consort, Rosewood Consort of Akron, and the East-West Consort. Five members of the chapter also performed a "thank-you" concert for the patrons of the Beachwood Library, where monthly meetings are held free of charge.

• Atlanta Chapter (GA) performed a spring concert at

Atlanta's High Museum of Art. Over 200 listeners were entertained by a selection of mostly Renaissance fare with a springtime theme. Hampton Court Minstralcye and Sforzandi, two local ensembles, also presented short programs of Renaissance and contemporary chamber music. Since the month-long observance was expanded from its original 1992 Play-the-Recorder Day, many ARS members have organized events. Begin to plan now for March 1997. Reports on this year's activities will continue to be shared in future *Newsletters*.


