THAT RECENT BUSY SIGNAL WAS THE ARS BOARD ON THE PHONE

Substituting a four-and-one-half hour phone call for a face-to-face meeting of two-and-one-half days, the ARS Board of Directors met in a telephone conference on Saturday, February 1, 1997. Board members agreed that the less expensive conference call format would be satisfactory for this winter meeting because clear goals had been set in September for each committee and officer and because they had been in close contact through the frequent use of e-mail communication.

President **Gene Murrow** remarked that his initial concern about the Board having so many newly elected members had quickly disappeared after he observed the smooth functioning of each committee and the excellent work of the office staff in providing support to them. He stated that the major challenge to the Board and the Society is to find new resources to build and support a much larger constituency.

The Board reviewed the current fiscal year budget and heard reports from the committees. Actions were taken to examine the funding of the CD Club project, to recognize the ARS/American Orff-Schulwerk Association joint committee as an advisory committee to ARS, and to firm up plans for and to promote the recorder events at the Boston Early Music Festival. The Board examined the proposed 1997-98 budget in detail and accepted it, with a few modifications and with the provision that it be reviewed at the September Board meeting.

Recently-appointed Board member **Mel Mendelssohn** presented a plan for an endowment fund campaign. Board members endorsed the first steps of this campaign by approving the creation of a Long-Range Planning Committee and by charging each committee to start framing long-range plans and needs.

The Board sent a message of good wishes to colleague **Martha Bixler**, who is recovering from a serious accident.

MENDELSSOHN APPOINTED TO ARS BOARD

As part of its preparations for the February 1 teleconference meeting, the ARS Board invited Mel Mendelssohn to join its ranks as an appointed Board member. He was able to become active immediately by participating in the teleconference.

A long-time ARS member residing in Shelter Island Heights, NY, Mendelssohn has an extensive background in fundraising. He is currently capital campaign director for Milton Ward & Co. Since he often travels to consult with various groups and institutions in planning their fundraising efforts, he takes his recorder and ARS Directory with him so that he can find others who share his musical interests.

ARS PROVIDES TEACHER CERTIFICATION AS A BENEFIT TO TEACHERS AND STUDENTS

Teaching recorder can be a complex process, one not necessarily learned in a university setting, as many other subjects are. As a service for its members who want to take stock of their skills after teaching for a few years, the ARS offers a teacher certification process.

Because not all teachers work with students of the same ability and expertise, the teacher certification process is divided into two levels: Level II teacher certification and Level III teacher certification. These levels are named for the corresponding playing exam that must be passed before one can apply for that certification. It also denotes the highest level student that the teacher is likely to teach.

Becoming a Level II teacher involves:

- passing the Level II playing exam;
- teaching for at least two years;
- possessing expertise necessary to teach children or adults the material in Levels I and II of the ARS Personal Study Program or the material in the Junior Recorder Society Class and Club programs.

Successful Level III teacher certification requires:

- passing the Level III playing exam;
- teaching for at least three years at various levels and in multiple situations (classes, private lessons, consort coaching);
- possessing expertise to teach all material in the ARS Personal Study Program.

As mentioned above, the first step in the teacher certification process is to pass the appropriate playing exam. Requirements and procedures for the exam are described in detail in the *Guidebook to the ARS Personal Study Program*. The next step in the teacher certification process is to submit an application, a resume, letters of recommendation from students and peers, and a video or audio cassette of the member in two teaching situations. The education committee has a sheet of suggestions for preparing this tape so that the teacher will be able to use the preparation as a personal learning opportunity. A non-refundable fee of \$100 is also submitted at this phase.

In the next phase of the process for certification, the applicant is given one month to complete an open-book examination covering basic music theory and knowledge of the recorder such as repertoire, reference books, pedagogy and general information. Since these are topics that often come up during teaching, the answers may already be familiar to the candidate—or, if not familiar, the

Thinking ahead to events planned for this summer's Boston Early Music Festival takes me back to a chance encounter that occurred for me during the 1995 BEMF.

His willingness to lead the way to these instruments with which he was so well-acquainted seems almost symbolic. How many amateur musicians on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean have followed his lead in learning more about the history and repertoire of the recorder?

process of finding the answers can provide more resources for the teacher.

As the phases of this process are completed, the candidate hopefully will become more aware of personal strengths and weaknesses and also will be aided by valuable suggestions for improvement given by a committee of experienced recorder teachers. Upon completion of the process, the applicant will receive a certificate of achievement recognizing the new status as a Level II or Level III certified teacher. The recipient may also choose to be listed as such in the *ARS Directory*, a resource for other ARS members seeking a qualified teacher. For those members able to study with a certified teacher, this ensures that their teacher has attained a certain standard of musicianship, proficiency on the recorder, and knowledge of the instrument's rich history and repertoire.

NEW ARS DIRECTORY SHOWS BREADTH AND DEPTH OF MEMBERSHIP

A look through the ARS Directory 1997 reveals a continually replenished, internationally diversified, technologically alert membership. Some interesting statistics:

- Number of new members added since the last *Directory*: 968;
- Teachers listed: 112 (up from 97 in the 1995 *Directory*);
- Consorts listed: 39 (up from 17 in 1995);
- Business members listed: 28 (up from 23)
- E-mail listings: 350 fitting on seven pages (compared with 47 addresses fitting on one page in 1995);
- Geographic distribution: chapters in 37 states, the District of Columbia, and two territories, and members living in 29 countries.

A new section of the *Directory* lists Workshop members, whose programs are described each year in the March *AR*.
