EAST BAY CHAPTER TO HOST FALL ARS BOARD MEETING; SITES SOUGHT IN FUTURE

The September 1998 meeting in Berkeley, California, will be hosted by the East Bay Chapter. As a means for getting feedback directly from members, the ARS Board holds its meetings at various locations where ARS chapters can assist with advance local arrangements. In recent years, chapters have assisted with ARS Board meetings in Chicago, Princeton, Seattle, Baltimore, Toronto, Denver, Dallas, and Kalamazoo.

As required by the ARS By-Laws, the Board meets in late September each year (traditionally on the last full weekend, unless there is some conflict on that date). It also convenes an additional time, usually on the last weekend of January or first weekend of February. Recently that winter meeting has been accomplished via a lengthy conference call, but may not always be held in that manner.

When the Board travels to a chapter site for a meeting, they typically are involved in meetings from Friday morning through Sunday noon. Little entertaining is required of local chapter hosts, as the Board agenda is always full. In addition to the daytime meetings, one evening meeting is used for a full Board meeting, while the other is the ARS Annual Meeting.

The local chapter arranges meeting location(s), which may be the facility where that chapter regularly meets. They also provide housing in their homes for a dozen Board members and two staff, and transport them to and from meetings. The weekend also traditionally includes a chapter-hosted potluck supper and a play-in led by a Board member, with the Annual Meeting conducted between the supper and the play-in.

DIRECTOR'S CORNER

Some members have expressed surprise to find that, as time permits, I read chapter newsletters and even notes written in the margins of renewal forms received in the office. I consider this a good way to keep in touch with all of you, a means for getting a feeling for what is happening out there in recorder everyday-land.

The comments on renewals can be timeless: a humorous note about wanting to take advantage of two-year renewals, but being wary of even buying green bananas; a question about how long it takes to be able to smoothly switch from C fingerings to F fingerings without experiencing mind-lock. Or, depending on time of year, the renewal may contain a brief reprise of several Christmas gigs played by that member's consort or of similar activities during the local Medieval feast. Favorite recorder pieces are sometimes jotted down by members fresh from rehearsal.

During the course of the year, recurring motives move fugue-like through chapter newsletters: similar topics for monthly meetings and similar favorites among pieces played (although the Orange County, CA, chapter certainly had a one-of-akind program of TV game show themes arranged for recorders); ways to compete with a Super Bowl broadcast coinciding with the chapter meeting (possibly those TV game show themes?); concerns for aging and ailing members; profiles of local recorder or chamber music groups, with encouragement to attend their activities as well as touring concerts by professionals; and ideas for growing new players from among the young or creating new players from among the old, by offering classes to help those with limited musical background become practicing (pun intentional) musicians themselves.

Having let the chapter newsletters pile up somewhat during the past few months when things have been too busy to keep up, I've only recently got through parts of the stack. From my personal standpoint, newsletters at this time of the year are enjoyable reading. In trying to at least skim most of each newsletter, I find myself first catching up on announcements of Play-the-Recorder Month events in February or March newsletters, and then immediately reading the post-event report in an April newsletter. If I couldn't be there, maybe I can convince myself that this is the next best thing.

Also, with end-of-year meetings approaching, there are numerous announcements of "open mike" chapter meetings where small groups play for friends and family, something I have always considered important as an acknowledgment of music's two-way communication feature. This time of year also brings pool parties (with Handel's Water Music played on plastic recorders), and white elephant sales to encourage spring cleaning of music files and closets while raising money for the chapter. Expanding its sale into the service sector, Twin Cities (MN) chapter offered a custom arrangement of recorder music for solo or small ensemble as part of a silent auction. Monterey Bay (CA) chapter used a similar enticement, an arrangement for five recorders, as a prize for the member who identified a mystery musical work after five months of clues printed in the chapter newsletter.

This time of year also brings reports on the multitude of chapter weekend workshops that bloom at this time of year. I read revelations about intonation, breathing, and the dramatic improvement made during just one Saturday of concentrated effort under the tutelage of an experienced workshop leader. With summer workshops just around the corner, can even more musical mastery be far away?

I may have to wait until September to find out from chapter newsletters, most of which take the same summer break as *American Recorder*. In the meantime, the office always enjoys a brief "my summer vacation" note. Or let us know your favorite recorder pieces, and we'll start compiling a greatest hits list to share with you later.
