# NEW ALTERNATE PROCEDURE FOR ARS TEACHER CERTIFICATION

Judith Whaley, chair of the ARS Education Committee, has announced an alternate method by which teachers can obtain ARS Level III teacher certification. (Level III teacher certification means that a teacher is competent to teach students at least through the Level III playing requirements of the ARS *Personal Study Program*.) Now, experienced teachers can have their credentials examined for possible exemption from all or part of the teacher certification requirements.

The standard process for earning ARS teacher certification, designed primarily to encourage teaching excellence that may have been achieved through non-academic channels, first starts with the applicant passing either the Level II or Level III playing examination (for Level II or Level III teacher certification respectively). Playing exam requirements are described in detail in the *Guidebook to the ARS Personal Study Program*.

The next step in the standard teacher certification process is to submit an application, a resume, letters of recommendation from students and peers, and a video or audio cassette of the applicant in two teaching situations. In the last phase, the applicant is given one month to complete an open-book examination covering basic theory and knowledge of the recorder such as repertoire, reference books, pedagogy and general information.

Criteria that will be considered by the Education Committee in granting exemptions from the full certification process include:

- 1. Institutions attended and degrees earned.
- 2. Recorder teachers of the applicant and dates of study, showing an extensive period of study beyond master classes.
- 3. Position(s) or job title(s) held by the applicant, especially current and past academic appointments.
  - 4. Workshops where the applicant teaches or has taught.
- 5. Accomplishments of the applicant's students, especially professional accomplishments or teaching appointments. The number of students who have passed the ARS Level III playing examination will also be considered.
  - 6. Recordings by the applicant.

To receive forms and more information about ARS exams or about becoming a certified ARS teacher via either method, please contact the ARS office. As with all ARS examinations, including both processes leading to teacher certification process, the applicant must be an ARS member. There is a \$20 fee to apply for the alternate process. If the Education Committee decides that the candidate must still fulfill part or all of the requirements, the \$20 fee would be applied to any other fees necessary to complete the certification.

Early submission of materials for evaluation by the Education Committee may result in a Level III teacher certification listing in the next biennial *ARS Membership Directory*, scheduled to be published early in 2001.

In this way, the ARS will receive more frequent input from members about its services, allowing for evaluation and quicker adjustment.
