Two winners (Sage and Tracy) are teenagers aspiring to become professional recorderists. Three recipients (Archer, DuBois, and Miller) hope to start or expand programs in their communities to teach recorder to young children using the relatively-new *Suzuki Recorder Method*. Three are graduate students (Aoyama and Kazik in music, Tamas in math), and the others are adults of all ages ranging in ability from beginner to advanced. Several recipients describe themselves as self-taught.

ARS summer scholarships are paid from memorial funds established by friends and family members of former ARS members: Andrew Acs, a gifted recorderist who shared his talents through his teaching at workshops; Jennifer Wedgwood Lehmann, a long-time member of the Princeton

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ARS ELECTION RESULTS

Congratulations to these newly-elected members of the ARS Board of Directors: Richard Carbone, Sheila M. Fernekes, Alan Karass, Carolyn Peskin, Sue Roessel, and János Ungváry. They will take office at the Board meeting on September 22, joining continuing members Ruth Albert, Martha Bixler, Frances Feldon, Cléa Galhano, Howard Gay, and John Nelson.

The organization wishes to thank all nominees for their willingness to serve the ARS, as well as those now retiring from Board service: President Gene Murrow, Vice President Judith Whaley, Secretary Shelley Wold, Virginia Ebinger, Bill Rees, and Israel Stein. Thanks also to members of the Nominating Task Force: Nancy VanBrundt (chair), David Barton, Letitia Berlin, Marilyn Boenau, Suzanne Ferguson, Scott Paterson, and Nikolaus von Huene.

While the ARS membership is split almost evenly between chapter members and those not declaring a home chapter, votes from chapter members comprised over 70 percent of the total. Members who joined more recently were more likely to have voted. Those who joined in the 1990s and 2000 sent in nearly 44 percent of the votes, with each earlier decade having a progressively lower percentage of the votes.

By geographic region, the Northeast U.S. sent in the majority of the votes cast: over 41 percent. The Midwest also sent in a significant number of ballots: 28 percent of the total.

Since the May issue of *American Recorder* went in the mail on May 26, 2000, and some members called or e-mailed in June to let us know that they did not have their ballots yet, all votes were counted, regardless of postmark.

Votes were counted with a subtotal showing two results: only those ballots postmarked by June 15 and a grand total of all ballots received. Comparing the timely subtotal with the total votes, there was no difference in the results for those elected.

The ARS By-Laws (Article V. B. 1) state that each biennial election will result in "five ARS members in good standing being elected by the membership...." In order to make the transition to biennial elections, first conducted in 2000, the By-Laws specify that "Five elected directors serving during the 1999 fiscal year shall have their terms extended until the election of 2002." However, since only four elected directors serving in the 1999 fiscal year are extending their terms until 2002, the nominee from the 2000 election getting the sixth-highest number of votes was added to the Board, in accordance with methods for filling Board vacancies as described in Article V. D. of the ARS By-Laws.

With the next ARS biennial elections just around the corner in 2002, preparations will begin soon. Please contact the ARS office if you would like to serve on the next Nominating Task Force or would like to suggest a member to run for the Board of Directors.

DIRECTOR'S CORNER

It's always surprising to me how regularly and quickly the preparation time for each biennial *ARS Membership Directory* arrives. It's that time again, so it's time to make sure that your information on file with the ARS is current, including:

- •Phone number. If you have moved since the 1999 *Directory*, please make sure that you have reported both your new mailing address and phone number—the latter often doesn't get changed, especially if the U.S.P.S. address change postcard is used. If you live in one of many locations that are adding new area codes, please let us know now if you have a new one going into effect soon, so that the new area code will be in the 2001 *Directory*.
- E-mail. If you've acquired or changed an e-mail address, the easiest way to inform us is to send the office an e-mail. Office contact information is listed on page two of every issue of the magazine.
- Newly-created zip codes. If you live in an area of the U.S. that has recently added new zip codes, please be sure to inform the ARS office.
- Teacher list. Anyone actively involved in teaching or coaching may be listed (those who have received certification through the ARS are highlighted). Since a member's activities may change, past listings do not mean automatic listings in future editions of the *Directory*; confirmation is necessary by returning the letter recently mailed to known teachers. If you have not received such a letter and want to be listed, please contact the ARS office now.
- Consort list. An ARS consort, which consists of three or more ARS members, receives various benefits including a listing in the *Directory*. If your consort wishes to be listed, send the name of your consort, a list of your members, your contact person for mailings from the office, and whether you accept new members.
- •Listing. Each ARS membership includes one free listing in the directory on a voluntary basis, and a member may opt not to be listed. Please let us know now if you do not want to be included.
- •Additional Directory listings. Memberships may include extra listings under two surnames at the same address, or under the same surname at two addresses (winter and summer homes, school and home, etc.). While several family members may join under one shared membership, that translates to a single listing in the directory. For situations where a shared membership involves two surnames, or for an additional address listing, you may send an extra \$5 for the second listing. (You will continue to receive one copy of ARS materials such as American Recorder, the Members' Library, and the Directory. If your two listings are for winter and summer homes, please let us know each time you migrate so that mailings are sent to your current home address. Mailing labels for each issue of American Recorder are prepared one month before each issue's cover date.)

To allow for printing deadlines and time to update the ARS database, please make sure we have your current information by November 1. To verify your information, please call Karen at 303-347-1181, 9 am-4:30 pm, Mountain time, Mon.-Thurs., or e-mail us .

Since 1997, the ARS has also posted some of the above information on the ARS web site. No individual member contact information is published there, except for phone numbers included on lists of teachers, chapters, and consorts. Full information for business and workshop members appears both in the *Directory* and on the web site.

Note: due to the upcoming *Directory*, names of new members who join this fall will be listed for the first time in the 2001 *Directory*. New members who join after it is prepared will be welcomed in a *Directory* update, printed as in recent years on the reverse side of each mailing flysheet for *American Recorder* beginning again in March.

YOUNG PLAYERS IN THE SPOTLIGHT FOR PLAY-THE-RECORDER MONTH

The eighth annual Play-the-Recorder Month celebration last March found several chapters teaming up with young recorder players for their events.

Winner of the Play-the-Recorder Month "Most Imaginative Event" contest for chapters was **East Bay** chapter (CA) for its bookstore event involving junior players, with both educational and performance components. In conjunction with Kids' Month at Borders Books & Music, East Bay chapter members and members of the **East Bay Junior Recorder Society** presented an informal joint concert. The chapter performed first, playing Vivaldi and Telemann before demonstrating different sizes of recorders by playing an ascending scale that moved progressively from bass up to garklein. Junior Recorder Society members then performed several pieces, after which both adults and children joined forces to play music by Handel.

The chapter with the greatest percentage membership increase in conjunction with Play-the-Recorder Month was **Monadnock** chapter (NH), with a 28.6% increase in its membership from seven to nine members. Both winning chapters won ensemble music donated by LaNDMark Press, Magnamusic Distributors, Inc., and ARS member composers David Goldstein and Ann McKinley.

Hudson Mohawk (NY) chapter members were allowed to talk above a whisper at their town library, where they presented a discussion of the recorder and its music, with musical examples ranging from German folk tunes to ragtime played by chapter members.

The debut performance of the **Princeton Recorder Society** ensemble in celebration of Play-the-Recorder Month took place at the Marketfair shopping plaza. Member conductors John Burkhalter, Joan Wilson, and Sue Parisi led an enthusiastic group of recorder, gamba, and percussion musicians, bringing smiles and applause from shoppers, many of whom picked up informational flyers about the recorder and the PRS.

Barnes & Noble bookstores served as sites for other Playthe-Recorder Month events, including a performance by the **Oriel Early Music Consort** of the **Hawaii** chapter and a Recorder Faire featuring small groups from the **Denver** (CO) chapter. Denver's event also included period dancers, accompanied by a Renaissance dance band of chapter members, and an elementary school group playing Latin music arranged by the group's teacher especially to attract the attention of his lower-income students.

A school group was also included in a performance of a recorder arrangement by **Chicago** (IL) chapter member Patrick O'Malley of *The Carnival of the Animals* by Saint-Saens. Held at the church where the chapter regularly meets, the Chicago performance involved the **Park View Recorder Ensemble**. The elementary school group also collaborated with a hand-bell choir and a middle school orchestra on other concerts in conjunction with "Music in Our Schools Month," celebrated each March by MENC: The National Association for Music Education.

Workshops also kept members busy during March. The New Orleans (LA) Early Music Society timed its annual workshop to occur during Play-the-Recorder Month, as did the Triangle Recorder Society (NC), and the Bergen County (NJ), Brandywine (DE), Greater Cleveland, Sarasota, and Boston (MA) chapters.

The Boston Recorder Society sponsored two perfor-
