BROCK ERICKSON IS NEW ARS EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Following an international search, the Board has chosen **Brock Erickson** as the new ARS executive director.

After its decision during the January Board meeting to name Gail Nickless, then executive director, as the new editor of American Recorder, a Board task force launched a four-month search culminating in the selection of Mr. Erickson. The task force, headed by Carolyn Peskin, consisted of Richard Carbone, Frances Feldon, Alan Karass, and Susan Roessel, along with ex officio members John Nelson and Mrs. Nickless.

While working for 18 years as a database programmer and analyst, Mr. Erickson also kept up a parallel career as a professional singer and flutist. Since 1996, he has sung in the St. Martin's Chamber Choir, a Denver-based professional 20-voice ensemble. In 1997, he joined the newly-formed Board of Directors for St. Martin's Chamber Choir. Later he was re-elected to its Board and served for three years as Secretary/Treasurer, also filling in during a three-month search period as the organization's interim executive director. He remains active both in the choir and on its Board, currently volunteering to maintain the web site that he designed for the group.

Mr. Erickson was graduated *cum laude* with a Bachelor of Music in Music Education degree from Kent State University, and has taken graduate courses in music composition and theory at the University of Denver.

Since starting on July 1, Mr. Erickson has been asked numerous times whether he plays the recorder. While not a recent player of recorder, his past music-making has included recorder, and his new position has inspired him to reacquaint himself with the instrument.

PLAY-THE-RECORDER MONTH (cont)

Recorders North Coast also held their second annual March workshop at a local gallery. Guest conductor Richard Geisler guided players through literature ranging from Renaissance and Baroque selections to traditional music of Bulgaria and Romania.

The **Boulder Chapter** held "Play-the-Recorder Day" at Borders Bookstore in a Boulder-area mall. During the four-hour event, 10 different groups performed. Over 50 individuals participated, with their ages ranging from 9 to 84, and the day ended with a Renaissance dance band jam session.

The ARS chapter with the greatest percentage increase in membership was **Ann Arbor (MI) Recorder Society**, which added one member during PtRM to bring its numbers to 13 members. **Magnamusic Distributors, Inc.** graciously provided their prize of a selection of recorder music ranging from William Byrd to Jelly Roll Morton.

Other chapters sent in news of their PtRM activities. Members of the Metropolitan Detroit (MI) Recorder Society shared a concert with the consort Good Neighbors All at a local library. Ron Hertz, music director of the chapter, provided musical and historical background to the program's selections.

A wide range of music was performed by the **Navesink Ensemble**, which played for a joint meeting of all Women's Clubs of central and northern New Jersey. As always, a rendition of "Teddy Bear's Picnic" was supervised by a number of the song's namesakes.

The **Hawaii Chapter** observed PtRM by holding an open rehearsal at a local shopping mall, boldly managing to be heard over the competing sounds of shoppers, diners and a fountain.

A concert began the activities for the **Sacramento (CA) Recorder Society**, where four ensembles played short programs followed by an open jam session.

The **Chicago (IL) Chapter** featured the presentation of winning selections from its biennial composition contest. Four composers listened as their pieces were performed by pre-selected groups, then read by all interested players.

All members of the **Westchester (NY) Recorder Guild** were invited to play at a Sunday service of Emanuel Lutheran Church in Pleasantville, where the group holds its regular rehearsals.

"The Many Faces of Orlando di Lasso" was the title of a workshop sponsored by **Aeolus Recorder Konsort (AR)** and presented by ARS past-president Martha Bixler. Participants attended from several states.
