CHAPTER GRANT REMINDER

Chapter grant applications were mailed to chapter leaders in October and should be returned to the ARS office with a postmark no later than **November 15.** Awards of up to \$300 are available to chapters having at least 10 ARS memberships in support of innovative projects beginning after January 1, 2003.

Grant applications will also be accepted May 15 for chapter projects beginning after July 1, 2003.

CORRECTION

In an article in the September ARS Newsletter reporting the winners of the Play-the-Recorder Month "Most Imaginative Event" contest, it was mentioned that the program given by **Recorders North Coast** (CA) included background information prepared by Carolyn Moskowitz. Ms. Moskowitz has written to clarify that she drafted the program, requesting specific subjects to be covered. The performers researched, wrote and presented material, which she felt made for more varied presentation than what a single speaker might write.

EXAM REPERTOIRE DEADLINE REMINDER

After last January's release of the thoroughly-revised *ARS Music Lists*, the Board announced that all repertoire submitted for any ARS exam must be taken from either the current *Music Lists* or a past version of that document. Members were given until 12/31/02 to take any ARS exam on which they want to play pieces not on any version of the *Lists*.

Requiring that music be chosen from either current or past versions of the *Lists* will maintain the standards of each Level exam and reduce the administrative burden of processing each exam application.

PLANNING UNDERWAY FOR BEMF

Since 1996 the ARS has utilized task force members to begin planning ARS events held in conjunction with summer festivals in Boston, MA, and Berkeley, CA. An informal meeting of interested individuals is held near the end of each summer festival to discuss potential recorder events at the next biennial festival, and to identify ARS members who want to help with those events. Based on feedback already received, preparations have begun for recorder events to be held at the 2003 Boston Early Music Festival (BEMF).

Anyone willing to serve on the task force for either BEMF or the 2004 Berkeley Festival should contact the ARS office. Many advance tasks can be accomplished by telephone or e-mail and do not actually require attendance at either festival or at meetings. However, assistance with on-site tasks is appreciated from those living near enough to help, and from those planning to travel to attend either festival.

ARS ANNOUNCES ELEVENTH GREAT RECORDER RELAY

Among the most popular events at recent summer early music festivals has been the ARS Great Recorder Relay, a series of vignette recitals showing the recorder in its many guises and raising awareness of the recorder as a serious instrument. Each Relay has attracted a healthy crowd, due to interest in hearing the recorder as well as the fact that it is one of the few free festival events offered.

Professional and emerging recorderists are invited to apply to perform on the eleventh Annual Great Recorder Relay, set for the weekend of June 13-14, 2003, in conjunction with the Boston Early Music Festival. The event is designed to showcase soloists and recorder groups who are developing, or starting to develop, a career with the recorder.

To apply, submit a proposed program of recorder repertoire lasting 20 minutes, along with a brief biography or resume. Those who have not performed on a previous Relay must also submit a recording of 15 minutes duration, to be evaluated by all committee members. Applications are not accepted from recorder groups taken from ARS chapters, unless a group's membership is comprised of professionals and emerging players. All materials must be postmarked before **January 13, 2003**. Contact the ARS office for more information and an application form.

The ARS Special Events Committee will review the materials submitted that fulfill the criteria for the event. While superior performing skills are important, the committee will strive foremost to construct a recital series showing variety in such factors as recorder repertoire and in groupings from solo to ensemble.

In addition to the volunteer performers, many volunteers are needed to make ARS events possible. Plan now to attend the festival and watch future ARS newsletters for a list of volunteer positions to be filled.

RECORDER POWER VIDEO NOW AVAILABLE

The ARS is pleased to announce a new video by John Tyson on teaching recorder to young students. In "Recorder Power," the respected educator and faculty member at the New England Conservatory of Music



illustrates techniques to help youngsters begin enthusiastically making music with the recorder.

Produced for the ARS by award-winning custom video company ArtMedia, and funded in part by a grant from the National Endowment for

the Arts, "Recorder Power" will be a great resource for classroom teachers as well as anyone wanting ideas for where to start in helping young musicians learn music through the recorder.

To borrow a copy, send a refundable \$10 deposit to the ARS office, along with a letter that includes your name, the address to which the tape should be shipped, and approximately how long you expect to keep the video.

The ARS already makes available another video for members' viewing, one that explores the artistry of avantgarde recorder wizard Pete Rose. The first part features Rose's dramatic performance at the 1992 Amherst Early Music Festival. In the second portion, Tyson interviews Rose about subjects such as when Rose started playing the recorder, what he looks for when choosing music for a recital, etc.

As with the Tyson video, the Rose recital video may be taken out on loan by sending a refundable \$10 deposit to the ARS office, along with a note containing your contact information and mentioning the proposed viewing date.

Chapters wishing to view either video as a meeting program should reserve a copy well in advance.
