ARS BOARD MEETS IN NORTH CAROLINA

The Triangle Recorder Society was a gracious and friendly host for the ARS Board of Directors meeting, held Sept. 27-29, 2002. Arrangements had been made for the Board sessions to take place in a comfortable meeting room in a retirement community in Chapel Hill, NC.

The entire Board spent the first day in committee meetings. On the second day a great many matters were discussed with the full Board participating. March 8, 2003, had been designated as "Play-the-Recorder Day," and a special piece composed by Carolyn Peskin was available during the meeting for the Board to see and play. A new video geared to elementary school teachers was recently completed by John Tyson, under the direction of the ARS and with NEA grant support, and is now available on loan.

The Board also undertook the important task of forming its leadership, incorporating newly-elected Board members alongside continuing ones. It elected officers from among its membership, with those officers to lead the organization for the next two years, and newly-elected President Alan Karass collected information regarding those willing to lead or serve on various standing committees of the society.

A Membership committee was created by the Board. Along with usual membership issues, the new committee will also be careful to consider the interests of special populations formerly served by the Seniors committee and the Junior Recorder Society, both of which have been made subcommittees of Membership. Pins with the ARS logo will be designed and produced to use as membership incentives and/or rewards.

There was an extended discussion of the current budget and the budget-making process. Our participation in events sponsored by other related organizations, such as the Boston Early Music Festival (BEMF) and Music Educators National Conference (MENC), was also discussed at length. It was decided to increase our offerings in 2003 at BEMF, and to try to get involved in local rather than national events of MENC.

A discussion was held in regards to ARS presenting a recorder conference in 2004, and a task force was appointed to look further into the preliminary proposal submitted at the meeting. Also, the A.R.S. NOVA 2000 long-range plan was discussed in terms of determining how the current actions of committees fit into the goals of this document.

The Triangle Recorder Society members hosted the Annual Meeting of the ARS on Sept. 28 at the Durham home of Pat Petersen and Doug Young, where everyone participated in a potluck dinner and a play-in. What a warm reception we all received and what tasty food was provided! It was also an important opportunity during a busy meeting weekend for the Board to be able to visit one-on-one with chapter members to learn more about their recorder and ARS activities.

ARS President Alan Karass introduced the Board members, who each made brief remarks about their responsibilities. All members present then talked about people's perceptions of how the ARS could serve them, as well as what they could offer the Society. Finally, Frances Blaker led the group in enthusiastically playing several selections for recorder orchestra. The sound was greatly enhanced by the presence of a contrabass recorder as well as a baroque bassoon in the back row!

DIRECTOR'S CORNER

Perspective.

As some of you may know, I happily divide my time between being the full-time Executive Director of the ARS, and being a classical singer here in the Denver area. I find it fascinating to see the arts world from two very different vantage points. As an administrator I get to experience and manage the day-to-day inner workings of a small, successful nonprofit organization, and as a musician I usually immerse myself in performance details and my own artistic expression. What's wonderful is that being deeply involved in both endeavors lets me find ways to inform my work in each area with insights gained from the other.

The position of ARS Executive Director demands constant attention to trying to serve the needs of many different constituencies. As I've mentioned in the past, our ARS membership includes schoolchildren and their teachers, performing professionals, and amateur adult players who play for their own enjoyment, whether alone, in small groups or in recorder orchestras. Each of these ARS members requires different things from the central organization, and both Gail Nickless, editor of American Recorder, and I are always trying to balance those varying interests and needs. I find that I am often able to establish a rapport with members and to anticipate their questions because I can communicate as a fellow musician who has many of the same interests. For example, I know how much we care about the quality and condition of our instruments (whether they are plastic, wood, ivory or vocal), and I am always dealing with the psychological and logistical issues of performance. Playing and singing are highly personal, spiritual and social expressions of who we really are, and one doesn't dare take that lightly (not to mention the fact we all share the knowledge that performing is a whole lot of fun!).

As a performer I sometimes forget that no concert or workshop can happen without a tremendous amount of behind-the-scenes work. There are always posters to hang, tickets to be sold, e-mails and mailings to go out, people to schmooze (OK, none of us really admits to schmoozing), performance venues to reserve and money to be managed. As ARS Executive Director I am reminded every day that an arts organization cannot function without a truly dedicated and supportive membership, local volunteers, an actively-involved Board of Directors, and a very focused administrative staff. Renee Baier and I do our very best to support your volunteer ARS Board in their very generous gift of their time, talents and vision for the ARS. The fulfilling of an arts organization's Mission Statement doesn't just magically happen; real people with real passion step up and make it happen.

Now when I step out on stage to sing Josquin or Barber I have a much better understanding of what has already taken place for the concert to have ever gotten off the ground. I'm not sure that many performers or arts administrators get the chance to see both sides of that world, and the perspective I've gained since joining the ARS family this year is already making me a more aware musician and a better administrator.

EXAM REPERTOIRE REMINDER

As of January 1, people taking the ARS Level Exams are required to choose their repertoire from the ARS *Music Lists*. Either the current *Lists* or earlier revisions may be used.

In an effort to keep abreast of the latest editions of recorder music, the Education Committee will update the *Music Lists* annually. Teachers who are familiar with the ARS *Personal Study Program* are invited to recommend music to be added to the current *Lists*.

Please send your recommendations to Carolyn Peskin, 3559 Strathavon Road, Shaker Heights, OH 44120, <carolynpeskin@stratos.net>). For each recommended edition, please include the composer's or editor's name, title, instrumentation, publisher, and edition number.

Only method books and studies, solos, and duets can be considered—no larger ensembles. Solo pieces may either be unaccompanied or have a keyboard accompaniment. If possible, please also categorize your submissions according to playing levels I, II, or III. (For examples of the difficulty level of pieces, use the 2002 or 1996 revision of the *Lists* as a guide.)

The deadline for receiving submissions for this year's update is April 1. Later submissions will be considered for the 2004 update. A subcommittee consisting of Martha Bixler, Frances Blaker, Constance Primus, and Judith Whaley will evaluate the submitted recommendations, and the selected editions will be included as an insert in the 2002 revision of the *Music Lists*.

Applications for summer scholarships, which cover tuition amounts of \$150-\$300, are now available and should be mailed to the ARS office with a postmark no later than April 15.

ARS scholarships are paid from several memorial funds established by friends and family members of former ARS members: Andrew Acs, a gifted recorderist who shared his talents through his teaching at workshops; Jennifer Wedgwood Lehmann, a long-time member of the Princeton (NJ) ARS chapter; and Margaret S. DeMarsh, director of the Adirondack Baroque Consort (NY). Both Acs and Lehmann also served on the ARS Board of Directors. Additional funding is provided this year through a special gift from the Monadnock (NH) Quartet in memory of Greta Schoenemann, and by anonymous gifts to the ARS.

Applications for weekend scholarships of less than \$125 are always accepted, but are best submitted two months before funding is needed.
