

SLATE FOR 2004 BOARD ELECTIONS TO BE CHOSEN THIS MONTH

The Nominating Task Force (NTF) for the upcoming Board elections has been following up on suggestions for potential Board members, and is nearing completion of its task.

Those interested in serving on the ARS Board had to return self-nomination forms to task force chair Shelley Wold by October 27. The nomination forms have been distributed to the NTF, which is narrowing down the field to no fewer than seven members whose names will appear on the election ballot (to be mailed with the March 2004 issue of *American Recorder*).

According to the ARS *By-Laws*, there are two ways of becoming a candidate for the ARS Board. The first is through the nomination process nearing completion.

The second is by submission of a direct petition. Anyone not selected through the nomination process may be placed on the election ballot by sending the following to the chair of the task force:

a petition signed by at least 25 members of the Society;
a statement of the nominee's qualifications for the post of Director;

3) a statement, signed by the nominee, expressing willingness to assume the responsibilities of a Director and to serve as a Director if elected.

Those wishing to become a candidate using the petition method will be sent materials in December. Please contact the ARS office if you would like to submit a petition to run for the Board. All petition materials are due to the NTF chair by **January 8** in order to appear on the ballot.

DIRECTOR'S CORNER

Passing the torch.

In June, the ARS presented David Goldstein with its first Presidential Special Honor Award. He was recognized as someone who poured indefatigable energy and countless hours into sharing his love of music with students of all ages. As I write this column in September, I have just learned that Mr. Goldstein passed away this week in New York City. Although he had struggled with serious health problems for some time, he was able to meet with ARS Board member Richard Carbone in late June to accept our award in person. Now his many friends and acquaintances from many years of music-making and teaching are saddened and grieving.

As time goes on, we lose people who matter to us: friends, relatives, others have served as an inspiration from afar. Each generation has its leaders, but each time that we lose someone who has been a positive example for us, we wonder who will pick up the torch to advance those causes that they held dear. Passion seems to surface in unpredictable ways and from unexpected corners of our community.

In my time with the ARS, I have met and heard about some amazing individuals who have a passion for recorder music. Sometimes that passion has grown over many years, and sometimes it is so fresh that we can only guess at its potential impact. Goldstein's contributions were highlighted in recent issues of *American Recorder*, so I'd like to tell you about some special people I've gotten to know.

On a recent evening, the Denver and Boulder chapters of the ARS hosted a potluck supper and play-in for local recorder players and the ARS Board of Directors, who were meeting in Colorado. The Colorado ARS members provided marvelous hospitality and creativity throughout the weekend, and the potluck evening was attended by players from all over Colorado's Front Range.

One of the many teachers and players who came to play and eat with us was Linda Lunbeck of Boulder. Linda is a conservatorytrained professional recorderist who is one of the foremost teachers of young players in our area. She assumed the leadership of the Colorado Recorder Academy this year in order to provide continuity for the students of the former Indiana Recorder Academy. Her many local students perform in public regularly, and the Young Hedgehogs, an ensemble of her teenage recorder students, have a spirit, confidence and camaraderie that any youth group should envy. Linda has a passion for what she is doing, and has passed that fire along to a new generation of recorder players.

Vince and Gina Gratton arrived just after the playing session began. Gina is a fourth-grader who has played recorder for two years. She and her father live in Pueblo, CO, where recorder is not offered in her school music classes. They had heard about the potluck, and Vince drove two hours so that Gina could participate. Vince clearly recognizes his daughter's passion for the recorder. Although they'd never met anyone at the gathering before, he brought her to Denver to expose her to an entirely new musical experience. At least 10 years younger than anyone else there, Gina bravely joined the playing, and was immediately taken under the capable wings of Board members Frances Blaker and Rebecca Arkenberg. Hearing and playing in a full recorder ensemble that included everything from soprano to contrabass was a revelation to both Gina and her very special father.

The torch is still ablaze. Think for a moment about who has inspired you along your way. Share your passions with those around you, nurture their talents and enthusiasm, and be sure to allow them to inspire you in return.

TWELFTH ANNUAL GREAT RECORDER RELAY

The ARS will host the Twelfth Annual Great Recorder Relay at the conference being sponsored by Early Music America next summer. The conference is scheduled for June 9-13 in Berkeley, CA, and the Relay will feature short recitals by a number of professional and emerging recorderists.

To apply for inclusion on the Relay program in Berkeley, submit a proposed program of recorder repertoire lasting 20 minutes, along with a brief biography or resume. Those who have not performed on a previous Relay must also submit a tape of 15 minutes duration, to be evaluated by all committee members.

Applications are not accepted from recorder groups taken from ARS chapters, unless a group's membership is comprised of professionals and emerging players.

All materials must be postmarked before **January 16.** Contact the ARS office for more information and an application form.

The ARS Special Events Committee will review the materials submitted that fulfill the criteria for the event. While superior performing skills are important, the committee will strive foremost to construct a recital series showing variety in such factors as recorder repertoire and in groupings from solo to ensemble.

In addition to the volunteer performers, many volunteers are needed to make ARS events possible. Plan now to attend the festival and watch future ARS newsletters for a list of volunteer opportunities.
