DIRECTOR'S CORNER

I've come a long way in the last two years. I'm a singer in the Webster University Choral Society (WUCS) in the St. Louis (MO) area. At a Christmas concert two years ago, I played a recorder duet as an accompaniment to a Christmas carol that our choir was singing. The parts were given to us a few days before the final rehearsal and were not in my favorite key. In short, I was breathtakingly nervous, with hands shaking and all.

Shortly after that, I decided that I needed more experience playing in public so that I wouldn't get so nervous. We regularly played at "low pressure" venues such as madrigal dinners and the St. Louis Shakespeare Festival. Playing at our annual concert in front of peers still made me nervous.

There was nothing much in between, so a few of us decided to focus on church venues. Several members of the St. Louis Recorder Society formed The Wydenwood Consort. Our focus was to find churches to play in, learn appropriate repertoire and play in public on a regular basis.

We've been successful in playing once or twice a month around St. Louis. Our strategy is working well.

In December, WUCS performed Dave Brubeck's *La Fiesta de la Posada*. The work starts with a solo recorder playing a folk melody. If you know this piece, you might laugh at how easy the part is. Even a year ago, I might have been tempted to pass the solo on to a fellow singer who plays recorder somewhat better than I do.

I really felt that it was time to step up to the plate and measure my personal progress in overcoming nervousness. Thankfully, I received my part two weeks before the performance—and had two dress rehearsals, to boot.

When the time of the concert drew near, I admit that I was feeling a bit nervous. The concert was in a large auditorium of the Community Music School, and we had a really decent crowd. But I did it! I managed to keep my hands from shaking, kept my breath under control and covered the holes of my seldom-played soprano recorder, making music under pressure.

I think I've come a long way in only two years, and it's progress that I can measure!

IN MEMORIAM

Dawn Culbertson, Baltimore, MD. Passed away November 25, 2004, at age 53 while attending the Baltimore Folk Music Society Thanksgiving Night Dance. Dawn had been an ARS member since 1984 and a member of the Society for Early Music of Northern Maryland. She also called English country dance, played recorders and lute for ECD (in another persona, she played punk lute), danced, and sang. In honor of this year's cicada visit, she choreographed and wrote the music to a dance called *Cicadas*. She was a journalist and wrote perceptive music reviews.

Judy DeMarrais, Needham, MA. Passed away during summer 2004. Judy was a member of the Boston Chapter and a member of the ARS since 1989. A dozen Boston Chapter members played at her service.

Leonard Gersten, Cresskill, NJ. Died in 2004. An active member of the Bergen County Chapter and editor of the chapter newsletter. A member of the ARS since 1963.

Blanche Kaplan, Teaneck, NJ. Died in 2004. Another active member of the Bergen County Chapter and a member of the ARS since 1979.

Robert D. Lisk, Elmhurst, IL. Died at age 88 in October 2004. A generous supporter of the ARS since 1988, he was a longtime member of the West Suburban Early Music Society. The chapter will miss his contributions in their playing sessions and his insights into performing contemporary music.

Glenn A. Ruby, Fall Church, VA. Died May 16, 2004, at age 65 of Diabetes Mellitus. He was an avid connoisseur of early modern music, with many other pursuits of a cultivated person. Glenn was an enthusiastic and active member of the early music scene, both at Penn State and in the Washington area. He played many instruments with sensitivity and skill, among them 'cello, viola da gamba, lute, harpsichord, piano and recorder, and he was much in demand to play with amateur musical groups. His musical interests were wide, from Medieval troubadour songs to jazz, with almost every period and style in between. For many years his summer vacations consisted of attendance at early music workshops, sometimes three or four in a summer. More recently, he was a regular attender at the Utrecht music festivals.

Joan M. Stamm, Aurora, IL. Died September 11, 2004. Joan was a member of the ARS since 1987 and also a member of the West Suburban Early Music Society of Illinois. Joan also was in West Winds and played in church services and made visits to public schools.

John Stark, Jr., Mobile, ÅL. Died in January 2004. A member of the ARS since 1974.

Peter Synnestvedt, Muskogee, OK. Passed away July 11, 2004. Was on faculty of Mount Union College for 29 years and a member of the ARS since 1981.

Evelyn Tarbell, Little Rock, AR. Of cancer, October 2004. She was a member of the ARS since 1993 and belonged to the Aeolus Recorder Konsort.

Carolyn Wilhoyte, Mulberry, AR. One of ARS's earliest members, Carolyn died in April 2004. She founded her consort, Renaissance Players.
