WELCOME TO INCOMING DIRECTORS (AND THANKS TO OUTGOING DIRECTORS)

Please join the returning ARS Board and ARS staff in welcoming the newest members of the Board of Directors: **Lisette Kielson** of Madison, WI, and **Mary Halverson Waldo** of Shorewood, MN.

Current Board members Letitia Berlin, Jerome Kaplan and Marilyn Perlmutter also return for another term.

These five individuals were selected from an extremely strong slate of candidates during last spring's election.

Two more ARS members were appointed to the Board of Directors effective 9/1/06: **Bonnie Kelly** of Lexington, MA, and **Leslie Timmons** of Logan, UT. Both have strong educational backgrounds, along with Kielson and Waldo. Education is sure to be a strong priority of the organization in the coming years.

The terms of directors **John Nelson**, assistant secretary (and a former ARS President), **Frances Blaker** and **Richard Carbone** expired at the end of August. All made great contributions to the Society as Board members, and we give them our sincere thanks for their years of leadership and service.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE CHANGES FOCUS: PHASES OUT ARS TEACHER CERTIFICATION

There has been long-standing interest from ARS members to offer accreditation to recorder teachers, in order to elevate the teaching standards and technical proficiency of instructors.

Despite inordinate amounts of time consumed by the committee in its revisions and continued development of the examination procedures, little interest was developed by recorder players or teachers to undertake the certification process. Part of the reason may be that there are now other avenues open to teachers and recorder players (particularly in the university system) that were not there when the ARS first made moves to offer teacher accreditation.

When Mark Davenport took over as chair of the Education Committee in September 2004, his first order of business was to re-evaluate the entire process.

After numerous conversations and correspondence with current and former Board members, the Education Committee made a formal recommendation to phase out ARS Teacher Certification. The Board officially approved the recommendation in February 2006, deciding that the ARS will no longer offer Teacher Certification.

Not to fear! The goals of raising the standards of recorder teachers, continuing to foster a healthy interest and appreciation of the recorder and its music remain; only the focus has changed.

The Education Committee will carry out its mission as follows:

- · Sustain the *Personal Study Program*, including updating its *Music Lists*, and supporting the Achievement Exams.
- · Continue to develop and update the Junior Recorder Society materials.
- · Continue to seek and acquire videos/DVDs about the recorder and make them available for educational purposes.
- · Support recorder workshops for music teachers in conjunction with accredited learning institutions.
- Identify and support teachers and performers (or institutions) who present successful and innovative recorder education activities throughout the U.S.
- · Conduct a survey of professional recorder ensembles and performers who give school presentations.

DONATE YOUR MUSIC: HELP THE ARS AND THE RECORDER MUSIC CENTER

What happens to recorder music when recorder players can no longer play, have to downsize, or pass away? Several very thoughtful people have donated their collections to the ARS in the last year.

Janet Welsh, a retired player in Columbia, MO, donated her entire collection of music last summer. When David Ruhl moved to California from Missouri, he donated some music to ARS. Between them, there were 277 pieces of music.

music in El Cerrito, CA.
The family decided to
donate Mary's music
collection, which numbered
270 titles, to the ARS.

The music is now at the Recorder Music Center (RMC) at Regis University in Colorado. Future plans are for the RMC to have enough copies of recorder music to function as a lending library, especially for works that are now out of print.

DVDS AND VIDEOS TO BORROW FROM THE ARS

RecorderPower!

Thanks to the husband of St Louis (MO) chapter member Coleen Bosch, John Tyson's video *RecorderPower!* is available in DVD format. This video presentation is an exciting resource about teaching recorder to young students. ARS members may borrow the DVD for a month by sending a check for \$5 to cover materials and shipping.

The ARS has tried to get the rights to some copyrighted material used in the presentation—rights that would be necessary in order to legally sell the video/DVD. Those have not been granted, and it would be cost-prohibitive and undesirable to re-edit it.

Pete Rose in Recital

Video recordings of a recital by professional recorderist Pete Rose are available on free loan through the ARS office. The live recording was made at the 1992 Amherst Early Music Festival.

The first part features Rose performing a variety of types of music. The second portion is an interview conducted by ARS member professional John Tyson, in which Rose tells how he started playing the recorder, what he looks for when choosing music for a recital, etc.

Pete Rose is hailed as one of North America's leading composers and performers of contemporary recorder music. His works have received worldwide acclaim and have been published by Universal Edition, Moeck, Carus-Verlag and Ricordi. Rose has given numerous recitals in the U.S. and Europe, many of them featuring a variety of contemporary music for the recorder, both written and improvised. He has won critical acclaim for his interpretation of works that involve microtonality, circular breathing and jazz elements.

Rose has also served as columnist, critic and contributing editor for *American Recorder* and has written articles for the German woodwind magazine *Tibia*. He has been a regular on the faculty of the Amherst Early Music Festival, and has given many master classes in the U.S. and Europe. Rose was awarded the ARS Distinguished Achievement Award in 2005 at the Boston Early Music Festival.
