ARS AWARDS PROFESSIONAL GRANT

Verena Wüsthoff has been awarded the **ARS Professional Development Grant** for 2007. She will be in residence at the Sitka Center for Art and Ecology in Oregon, where she will remain for three months ending in May.

A major part of her residency is dedicated to studying a new solo program of contemporary music for the recorder. All compositions are related in some way to nature—*e.g.*, picturing the sea (*Seascape* by Fausto Romitelli), sunrise (*Charavgi* by Calliope Tsoupaki) or a hummingbird (*Huitzitl* by Gabriela Ortiz). The working title of the program is "NATURE—contemporary music on natural phenomena."

Later during her stay she will work on duo repertoire and focus on promoting the projects of her ensemble **Windspiel**, a contemporary music duo. Together with accordionist **Eva Zöllner**, she plans a duo tour along the West Coast of the U.S., giving concerts, lectures and workshops at a number of universities and other venues. The duo hopes to encourage new compositions that it will play later, by other American composers.

The residency also gives Wüsthoff the opportunity to meet members of the Oregon Coast Recorder Society—sharing her work and teaching recorder workshops at Sitka.

Wüsthoff studied the recorder at the Musikhochschule Köln in Germany and the Hochschule der Künste Bern in Switzerland, where she obtained her teaching and performing diplomas.



Constantly seeking new inspiration and insights for her artistic work, she regularly takes part in international workshops and master classes—with T. Hosokawa, MusikFabrik, E. Molinari, J. Schwarzer and others. Wüsthoff is dedicated to the performance of contemporary music, particularly contemporary chamber music for recorder and other instruments. She appears regularly in concerts and festivals such as Biennale Bern and Ferienkurse Darmstadt, both as soloist and as a member of various ensembles.

In order to develop and explore new sounds and dramatic qualities in the recorder repertoire, she works with and is in communication with composers all over the world—currently in Japan, Germany, Switzerland and the U.S. Several new chamber music pieces for the recorder have resulted from these collaborations and were premiered by **Windspiel**, the duo that she established with accordionist Zöllner in 2000.

The development of concert programs that combine music with other arts (theater, film, media, literature, etc.) has also been a vital aspect of her artistic work. In that context, she has worked with composers and artists like Maurizio Pisati, Beat Gysin, Stefan Wanzenried and others. These programs are performed at well-known festivals and on concert series such as Biennale Bern (2003), Flauto! Fribourg (2004), KIK Aarau (2005), Musik21 (2006, 2007), and the European Recorder Teachers Association Congress (2007).

Sherrick adds future chapter events, such as concerts and workshops, to each chapter/consort listing on the ARS web site.

MORE WEB SITE NEWS

The ARS web site has been substantially upgraded. The web site is easier to navigate, and new and renewing members may now pay dues online or make donations using a secured server. The ARS CD Club listings now also include available CD cover graphics. Calendar events now may be submitted online.

The new site (still found at <www.americanrecorder.org>) was designed by professional web designer **Joyce Callanan** of Command Design Graphics. It features images provided by professional photographer and recorder player **William Stickney** of Seattle, WA.

The web site upgrade was possible largely due to donations made available from the 2005 President's Appeal and 2006 Spring Fund Drive.

The ARS plans more upgrades later in 2007, adding a membersonly password-protected area and a shopping cart feature, as additional funds are available.

ARS-AMSTERDAM LOEKI STARDUST QUARTET COMPOSITION COMPETITION

The ARS, in collaboration with the Amsterdam Loeki Stardust Quartet (ALSQ), is now receiving submissions to its composition competition for recorder music. September 10 is the deadline for entries to reach the ARS office.

The competition's goal is to expand the recorder quartet repertoire with new music for professional recorder players by composers from the U.S. and Canada.

Entries will be evaluated by members of the ALSQ and Dutch composer **Peter-Jan Wagemans**. All winning compositions will receive a cash prize. The first prize composition will have its premiere during the American segment of the ALSQ *Flutes on Fire* tour in February 2008 and also be featured on a CD of music by American composers to be released by ALSQ in 2008 on the Channel Classics label. At the discretion of ALSQ, second and third prize compositions may also be performed during this segment of the tour and included on the recording. The CD insert will include a brief biography of the composer(s).

The 2008 *Flutes on Fire* tour will include additional venues in Japan, Taiwan and Europe. Winning compositions may be selected by the quartet's agents for performance at one or more of these locations.
