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IN MEMORIAM

Shirley Cahn, Montréal, QC, Canada. Died 2/4/09 at age 80. Shirley had a long and very enjoyable career teaching biology at McGill University. She was also passionate about music: both playing with friends and attending concerts.

Shirley was a member of the ARS since 1964. She was one of the founding members of the Montréal Recorder Society—formerly ARS Musica, designating its affiliation with the ARS. She played gamba and recorder regularly with friends and with the Montréal Recorder Society, and took part in many workshops both in Canada and the U.S. Her passion for music was contagious and her knowledge of the history of music of the era was inspiring.

She was a longtime CAMMAC member, and one of the initiators and founders of Early Music Week, based on her experience at the Amherst Early Music Festival. In the first couple of years, it was she who suggested teachers, organized the pre-registration and made sure that early music had a place to flourish at CAMMAC.

There was rarely an early music concert that Shirley did not attend. Frequently found in the front row, she basked in the music; it was truly a source of joy for her. She will be missed. (*Provided by Susan Van Gelder*)

Monroe, Robert B., Seattle, WA. Died 10/21/08 at age 77. From a very early age, Bob greatly admired his maternal grandfather, who was a family doctor, and was determined to become a doctor himself. In 1949, he was awarded a music scholarship to Midwestern Uni-versity in Wichita Falls, TX, and played drums in the marching and concert band while doing his pre-med studies. In his senior year a freshman drummer, Peggy, caught his eye. They married after he completed two years of basic science in South Dakota's School of Medi-cine. He subsequently completed his M.D. degree at Northwestern University School of Medicine. After a one-year internship in Philadelphia and two years working for the Bureau of Indian Affairs in New Mexico (as a doctor for the Navajo and Ute tribes), they came to Seattle. Except for two years in Ecuador serving as a Peace Corps physician, he worked for Group Health Cooperative as a family doctor, geriatrician and nursing home physician from 1960 until he retired in 1996. His biggest single accomplishment was the transformation of the Family Practice Residency program during his tenure as director.

He had many interests outside of work: tennis, travel, cooking, gardening, reading and active membership in the Quaker meeting. Besides being an accomplished musician in the Bellevue Philharmonic and the Seattle Philharmonic, Bob spent many hours playing the recorder and was president of the Seattle Recorder Society at one time. He also played the viola da gamba with other early music enthusiasts.

Bob was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease in 2000 and lived since 2005 in Gaffney House, a supported living facility. The Quaker community and his many friends and family members kept up his spirits and made music for him, helping to light his path through the long darkness of Alzheimer's.
