The Board discussed committee organization, content and navigation of the ARS web site, our upcoming Festival & Conference in St. Louis from July 30-August 3, and ways of celebrating the 70th anniversary of the ARS. The Education Committee has put Level I of the Personal Study Program on the web site and soon will also add Levels II and III, in an effort to guide members in improving their recorder playing skills. The Publications Committee has made

the Consort Handbook available online, and will post the Chapter Handbook after updating this 1999 resource. The Scholarship Committee will soon begin its annual deliberations on summer scholarship applications. Likewise, the Chapters & Consorts Committee will soon review applications from chapters who participated in the yearly Play-



the-Recorder Month contest, with awards provided by some of our Business Members. On Friday night the Board met with the chapter to celebrate its 50th anniversary. We were treated to a wonderful concert by various configurations—from a quintet to a dectet- of 10 of its members (including founder Natalie Morgan, who received a certificate from Lisette Kielson, at left). The chapter groups played five pieces, ranging from the 16th century to the 20th, all with great spirit and skill.

Next, we played together-20 chapter members and 14 members of the Boardmaking a wondrous sound on works led by Lisette Kielson, Tish Berlin and Mark Davenport.Refreshments and conversation ended the event, sending all home tired, happy with having met more recorder friends, and satisfied.

Annette Bauer has been awarded the 2009 ARS Professional Development Grant. She is in residence at the Sitka Center for Art and Ecology (OR) through May 21.

A native of Germany, Bauer has a dual background in early music, as well as the classical music of North India. She trained as a recorder player at the Schola Cantorum in Switzerland, then moved to California in 2001 to continue her studies on the sarode, a stringed instrument, at the Ali Akbar College of Music.
