

RESULTS OF ARS BOARD ELECTION

RESULTS OF PERIODICALS SURVEY

At least once a year these days, the ARS Board of Directors wrestles with how to deliver *American Recorder* magazine and the *ARS Newsletter* when considering both budget and the state of technology. A quick survey was put together in May to ask members what they thought.

The survey was offered two ways. An e-mail invitation went out to all members who allow the ARS office to send them e-mail, a total of 1476 members. We received 621 responses to the online survey, a 42% response rate. The survey was also printed in the May *Newsletter*, which was mailed to over 2100 members (including the 1476 with e-mail). Mail replies were received from 31 members. This summary combines the results.

1. 48% of respondents only want to read a hard copy. 12% said they only read *AR* online.

2. 594 respondents (95%) said that they have computers at home.

3. 60% of respondents said they read each magazine.

4. 62% of respondents would be glad to read the *Newsletter* online. 19.8 % (or 123 members) said they either could not read it or would be upset if only an online version were available.

For the fiscal year that started this month, the Board was able to balance the budget without taking any drastic measures. The question will probably come up again as expenses (especially postage) rise and society becomes more internet-savvy. But for now, we are *status quo*.

APPLY FOR CHAPTER GRANTS NOW!

November 15 is the deadline to apply for a chapter grant. The ARS Chapter Grant Program is intended to help chapters initiate new projects or to expand existing

projects by adding new features that the chapter may have difficulty financing on its own. It is meant to provide aid for one-time chapter projects or "seed money" for projects that the chapter might continue to finance by other means. Grants are usually up to \$300.

Preference is given for projects that:

- Show promise of increasing local and national membership
- Reach new audiences leading to greater diversity in ARS membership
- Provide special services (for example, to elderly, school children, beginners, visually impaired, sick and disabled, economically impaired, etc.)
 Grants are not made for workshops.

Applications are due **November 15** for

FAQ: Why doesn't the ARS offer a Senior discount? Because about 45% of our members are 61+, a discount would take a bite out of dues income. We already pinch pennies every way imaginable to balance the ARS budget, and try to find more ways to add value to membership. We hope you understand and continue to support the ARS by renewing your membership each year.

CHANGES TO MEMBERSHIP LEVELS Every few years, the ARS Board examines membership

levels, and makes adjustments as needed. Typically, dues go up a little every three years. The Board decided not do that now, when the economy is still

suffering.

Bronze Membership is a new online membership level geared to attract new members. It is a marketing "hook" to try to eventually up-sell to a regular \$45 membership. Bronze members receive two *Members' Library* sheet music editions downloaded from the ARS web site, plus an e-mail newsletter. The Silver Membership is the typical one- or two-year membership, with a 10% discount on ARS merchandise like CDs. Gold Members pay \$150 and receive a ARS 2GB thumb drive, an ARS pin, a 15% discount and a tax

deduction. The Platinum Membership is a lifetime membership, with an ARS T-shirt, ARS 2GB thumb drive, an ARS pin and 20% merchandise discount, plus a tax deduction.
