FLYING HIGH: BOARD MEETS NEAR ADDISON AIRPORT

The ARS Board of Directors met April 19-21 in Addison, TX, near Dallas. In attendance were David Podeschi, president; Ruth Seib, vice-president/assistant treasurer; Jennifer Carpenter, secretary; Wendy Powers, treasurer; Alice Derbyshire, assistant secretary; Susan Burns, administrative director; David Melanson, Greta Haug-Hryciw, Barbara Prescott, Mollie Habermeier, Nancy Gorbman, James Chaudoir, Carol Mishler; and Gail Nickless, *American Recorder* editor.

One of the first orders of business was to replace Board member Anne Timberlake, who resigned for personal reasons. **Carol Mishler** was appointed by Board vote to finish Anne's term, which ends in August 2018. Mishler will serve on the Board's Fundraising and Communications committees.

In March, the ARS sent a **survey** to members asking a wide variety of questions. Already involved as a non-Board volunteer, Mishler reported on responses, which are also summarized in this *Newsletter*. We thank you for taking time to complete the survey.

Your continuing generosity made the fall **2017 President's Appeal** fund drive one of our most successful in recent years! The Finance and Fundraising committees continuously work to ensure sufficient cash flow for the ARS's operating expenses and for our outreach goals. Did you know that, if we even modestly increase our membership, we could offer even more for our members and via our outreach programs? Please encourage your fellow consort, chapter and recorder orchestra (CCRO) members to join the ARS and support the recorder community!

A primary goal of the Board is to foster a working relationship with our **CCRO leaders**. Alice Derbyshire and

ARS MEMBER SURVEY RESULTS: ARS BOARD IS LISTENING

Results of the **2018 ARS member survey** are in! The ARS Board conducted the online survey in March to learn its members' views of the society's benefits and recorder resources, grant activities, fundraising practices, and communication channels. Responses from **580 ARS members** have offered the Board a wealth of opinions on these and other topics.

On the question of ARS benefits to members, the survey underscored the importance of American Recorder magazine, the Members' Library music editions included with the magazine, and the ARS Newsletter. These benefits were rated "extremely" or "fairly" important by more than 80% of the survey respondents, topping the list of ARS benefits the survey asked about. While they value these benefits, many people offered suggestions for their improvement. Some respondents want to see AR offer more practical, less academic articles. The "focus should be on how to improve one's playing and related issues," wrote one person.

Other comments offered advice on how to improve the ARS web site, offer more benefits to ARS chapters, communicate better with members, help with access to free music, increase recorder activities in regions of the country, and assist school music teachers.

Finally, some people expressed ignorance about the range of benefits and recorder resources that ARS offers—for example: " As a very new member, I'm not familiar with most of these benefits. I do appreciate being part of a large group of recorder players, and look forward to exploring how I can best make use of the many benefits."

Fundraising Ideas Rated: As a charitable organization, ARS solicits and accepts donations and, in fact, depends on them. A section of the survey was devoted to fundraising.

Just over one-third of respondents (34%) said they had made a donation to ARS in the past two years. Over twothirds of the respondents believed that having their donation matched by another funding source would be "very" or "somewhat" likely to cause them to make or increase their donations. There was also interest in giving in memory of a deceased friend/ recorder player and in giving for a specific project or purpose. These options were rated highly by more than half.

Relatively few people said they were interested in being recognized for their donation, such as publishing their name in a list or receiving a token gift from ARS. As one person wrote: "I donate because I want the organization to survive."

Member benefits and fundraising were two key topics the survey addressed, but there were many other questions as well. The full survey results were discussed at the ARS Board meeting in April, and actions are being planned based on what ARS members say they want. Thanks to all who participated. The ARS Board is listening.

DALLAS RECORDER SOCIETY SPONSORS WORKSHOPS FOR TEACHERS AND LOCAL MEMBERS

On January 6, the **Dallas Recorder Society** (DRS) enjoyed a day-long series of workshops with **Jody Miller** of Georgia—thanks, in part, to a chapter grant from the ARS. Miller, who brings a wealth of talent and experience to the table, worked with beginners and advanced players alike, including the inaugural gathering of the

Burr Oak Recorder Orchestra (who knew Glenn Miller's *Moonlight Serenade* could sound so sweet on recorders?).

He also coached an ensemble from the group on Sören Sieg's rocking *Ka Go Sale Mosso* (from the *African Suite No. 2*), which they later performed on a series of Dallas Symphony Orchestra youth concerts in May.

Then, on January 8, Miller and DRS co-director **Jamie Allen** led a room of 35 elementary music teachers through a recorder-centric professional development session. Allen, who is also the education director for the Dallas Symphony, started by taking the teachers through what to expect in the upcoming "The Orchestra Rocks" youth concerts. (This is one of the interactive LinkUp! programs, designed by Carnegie Hall, in which students are

invited to play along with the orchestra for certain selections). Allen also covered how to use the curricular materials, and how to create the best possible performance experience for teachers and students alike.

[^]Miller followed this with a rich presentation on how to model good recorder playing to elementary students, and tips for creating a truly successful recorder program on the school campus. Several DRS folks attended this in-service

session as well, as some of them may end up visiting local Dallas classrooms to help teachers and students prepare for their LinkUp! experience.

This was the first time Miller had ever worked with the DRS, and everyone involved agreed that the whole weekend was a terrific success. It was an inspiring way to start the new year!

Lipnik Selects "Wonderful" Music for Sarasota Workshop "A great day with wonderful music and a super-perfect leader!" was one player's comment on the evaluation form of the **Sarasota** (FL) Chapter's February 10 recorder workshop led by Larry Lipnik of New York. As the guest clinician, Lipnik led 47 recorders players in day he called a *Musical Journey through Time*. One workshop participant noted that the day offered "the best overall selection of music I can recall," while another "loved the music" that offered varying challenges for participants. Made available ahead of the workshop, selections played included compositions by Seibert, Sanz, Monteverdi and many others.

Lipnik directed the players in a "kind manner of correction without being heavy-handed. Often hilarious!" commented one player. He offered advice on using breath more effectively, musical phrasing, and even certain fingerings. Many participants especially liked his technique of having them practice the difficult parts as a group before reading the piece.

While in Sarasota, Lipnik coached the **Faire Wyndes Renaissance Consort**, a guartet that performs with the

Sarasota Earlye Musicke Consort on Renaissance recorders. The Sarasota chapter has 37 members, but the annual February workshop draws players from Orlando, Lakeland, Gainesville and Naples.

VANCOUVER WORKSHOP: A CONCERT BONUS

On March 3, **Vancouver** (BC) recorder players had the special treat of a daylong workshop with two members of **Flûte Alors!** Many thanks to the ARS for their grant towards the expense of presenting the workshop.

Most participants arrived energized and inspired by the group's *Bach 'n' Jazz* concert the previous evening. Out of McGill University for only a handful of years, the ensemble played with fabulous intonation and timing, impressive speed and ensemble cohesion using a few articulations some had not heard before.

Our workshop teachers were **Caroline Tremblay** and **Alexa Raine-Wright** from Flûte Alors. Students self-divided into a room of advanced players and another of intermediate. Each group had classes on breathing/intonation and articulation in the morning, followed by two periods of repertory after a catered lunch. Breathing class started with many of the experiential exercises from manuals such as Dutch pedagogue Walter van Hauwe's *The Modern Recorder Player*, and progressed to anticipating the perfect breath speed for each note. We tested our understanding by playing simple exercises with rising and falling passages and leaps.

It was in the articulation class that old players learned some new tricks. Vancouver has been without regular teachers for a while, so getting our tonguing out of a rut seemed very valuable! We learned how to use *Dah, Deh* or *Dee* for low, middle and high registers, and how to end notes with *Den, Ded* or *Det* for degrees of staccato and legato. And finally we had some success with *DGDG* double-tonguing. Perhaps there's hope for Telemann and Vivaldi allegro passagework after all!

The afternoon repertory classes offered fine opportunities to apply new techniques. My group warmed up with *A Viol Round* of Purcell and a *Lamento di Tristana* and *La Rotta* from the 14th century, then moved to a sprightly Telemann *Concerto No. 1, TWV40:201,* and a very chromatic Bach A minor *Fantasy.* The highlight for many players was Matthias Maute's *Ricercar,* in which the goal was to learn to play controlled glissandi of intervals up to an octave by rolling the fingers.

I look forward to hearing the fruition of our workshop in the British Columbia Recorder Society's Spring Showcase!

IN MEMORIAM

Comer, Ralph, of San Antonio, TX, passed away in March. He earned five university degrees, including two Master's and two Doctorates, and served in the Navy for many years as a medical officer. In retirement, Ralph was active in the fishing club, pickleball, bridge, Village Voices and Singalong Strings. He and his wife Joanne, still an ARS member, helped to start the Village Sweetpipes recorder group. Ralph and Joanne joined ARS in 2012.

Driscoll, Daniel, passed away on July 26, 2016. Born on October 4, 1938, he graduated from University of Cincinnati in 1961 with a Bachelor's degree in electrical engineering. Dan's lifelong love of music began with playing French horn in his high school orchestra. He developed a collection of musical instruments from around the world—playing some in church choir, Knox Traditional Strings, Knox Town Band and Delmar Community Orchestra. He formed the Helderberg Fife and Drum Corps and the Hudson-Mohawk ARS Chapter. His passion was serving the community. He joined ARS in 1964.

Shrager, Richard Isaac "Dick," of Rockville, MD, passed away December 26, 2017. He was employed for 40+ years as a research mathematician at the National Institutes of Health (NIH) in Bethesda, MD. He loved science, math, music, reading and his family. An arranger, composer and singer, he directed the NIH Singers, NIH Madrigal Singers, NIH Horn Choir, NIH Chamber Singers, Montgomery County Jazz Guitar Workshop, sessions of the Washington Recorder Society and Early Music Society of MD–Baltimore, Cedar Lane Church choir, and Cedar Lane Church's chamber choir Gruppo Piccolo. He played in the Columbia Recorder Quartet and Three Seasons Recorder Trio. He had been a member of ARS since 1984.

Cochran, Kathy, died in January. The East Bay (CA)Recorder Society (EBRS) lost a longtime leader. Kathy had the longest history with EBRS of any currently active member and remained on the Board as a member-at-large to the present. When I joined in the late 1980s, Kathy was president.



Recorder players in San Francisco crossed bridges to Marin or East Bay, until the San Francisco Recorder Society was revived in the 1990s. The Marin Recorder Society was thriving and ran the popular Headlands Workshop every May. EBRS had serious ongoing financial troubles; it was under Kathy's leadership that we held our first workshops. These were so successful that EBRS became financially solvent and could become a donor to ARS and the San Francisco Early Music Society (SFEMS), and to the newly-

formed East Bay Junior Recorder Society. Kathy grew up in the Midwest playing clarinet, then switched to bassoon. She played in band and sang in chorus in college, where she majored in Spanish. In the mid-1980s, she moved to the Bay Area to teach high school Spanish and French.

Mary Ellen Reed re-introduced Kathy to recorders, at first playing together in her car to avoid disturbing neighbors. They attended SFEMS workshops and joined EBRS. There they met other players and formed an ensemble, coached by Marilyn Boenau (now of Amherst Early Music), who introduced them to Renaissance recorders and also to shawms and curtals. They were the first amateurs in EBRS to play loud band instruments.

Kathy's generous spirit was always present as a volunteer teacher to the chapter beginners' group and newcomers' group, and as coach of ensembles for Members' Recitals. Kathy loved learning new skills and sharing that knowledge with others. I was lucky to be a recipient of that gift for many years.

Revitalization of the Boulder (CO) Chapter

Several years ago the Boulder chapter membership was in decline, and the group considered disbanding. A problem was the practice of hiring a different leader for each of 10 monthly meetings per year. It was difficult to find enough presenters who could inspire members to attend.

The solution was to appoint a music director and conductor to lead eight meetings each year, with two meetings led by favorite guest presenters. We added a "newby" session before each meeting to welcome beginners and prepare them for the music to be presented. We began an annual one-day fundraising workshop in Allenspark, CO, that attracts recorder players from Boulder, Denver and other cities nearby. With restored membership, annual dues of \$25, and workshop fees of \$35, the chapter is financially stable.

Our music director and conductor, **James Grush**, adapts or arranges much of the music we play. Many of these pieces are edited and notated by another member of the chapter, **John Geohegan**. This reduces costs and gives members the chance to play recorder music not available elsewhere. Haydn, Mozart, Schubert, Brahms and Debussy are now usual fare at our chapter meetings! Members also enjoy playing unique and lively arrangements of public domain popular songs.

These pieces have also been performed by the eight-member New Recorder Consort and played by the Golden West Senior Residence Recorder Group. Grush and Geohegan now have a substantial library of recorder pieces derived from public domain sources, and are also making a selection of these available to the public at *www.JGJGsheetmusic.com*.

AMERICAN RECORDER RALLY

Montréal (QC) recorder virtuoso **Matthias Maute** is currently bringing a new project to the U.S.: the **American Recorder Rally**.

Working with up to 12 ARS recorder orchestras and chapters around the country, Maute has created a largescale concert program. The 2018 project, sponsored in part by the ARS, is designed to give players of intermediate level and above an opportunity to perform Maute's newly-composed *Concerto for Recorder Orchestra and Recorder* under the composer's guidance and leadership. Maute directs participants in a twohour rehearsal, with a performance the same day. The concert selections also include solo works performed by Maute on recorder and traverso.

This spring, the **American Recorder Rally** took off in the northwest. **Susan Campbell in Portland, OR**, and **Nancy Gorbman in Seattle, WA**, did a great job preparing the events. The formula of rehearsing for two hours followed by a public concert turned out to be both elegant and efficient: participants liked the intensity and the goal; audiences liked the result.

Both concerts were very well-received. The concert features the recorder in all its splendor: the recorder orchestra delved into the consort music of the 17th century and excelled in accompanying during the contemporary concerto (hot off the press!), whereas the solo repertoire showed the extravagant beauty and virtuosity of our instrument even when left alone! Chapter Tidbits Dick Munz reports that the Denver (CO) Recorder Society posted a rendition of Grandma Got Run Over by a Reindeer at https://youtu. be/41A28TmiD6Y. "Our

December Meeting included over 20 intrepids who put their reputations on the line, bravely rehearsing an arrangement no one had ever played, led by a conductor with little conducting experience, and following the lyric lead of a singer who had never sung it, and then putting it on YouTube. How could we miss?... I think this effort is astonishingly good for one short hour of practice."

Sophie Larivière, co-director of Ensemble Caprice, was special leader at the March meeting of the Tucson (AZ) Recorder Society. After some great warm-up exercises, she set the pace with a variety of music, keeping about 25 players well engaged for two hours. When she asked after an hour if the group wanted a break, everyone wanted to press on. By the end, all were exhausted and motivated in a good way.

Most members returned the next day to hear the Ensemble Caprice concert, "iLove Baroque: Short Stories and Voices of Eternity" with **Matthias Maute** and **Larivière**, recorder and Baroque flute; **Susie Napper**, 'cello; **David Jacques**, Baroque guitar; and **Ziya Tabassian**, percussion.

Tucson treasurer **Char Cordes** arranged the event.



Barbary Coast Recorder Orchestra Now in its seventh year, the Barbary Coast Recorder Orchestra (BCRO) is an ensemble in the San Francisco Bay Area (CA) and an educational outreach program of early music ensemble Voices of Music (www.voicesofmusic.org/ BCRO.html).

BCRO's name references historic 19th-century San Francisco, evokes a flavor of diversity, and imparts one of its objectives: to perform unconventional works for recorder orchestra, including contemporary repertoire, pop and jazz arrangements, and newlycommissioned works. The recorder orchestra also plays earlier repertoire from the Middle Ages, Renaissance and Baroque in arrangements giving voice to the unique sounds of the recorder orchestra.

BCRO is a "democratic" recorder orchestra, in which all of its invited members may play recorders from soprano to bass. In addition, many members play "big" bass recorders, including great bass in C, contra bass in F, subgreat bass in C, and subcontra in F. BCRO led a successful fundraising campaign to purchase its subcontra—a rare instrument, which fills out and enriches the bass section.

The 2017-18 BCRO comprises about 32 members. Frances Feldon and Greta Haug-Hryciw are founders/co-directors (*in photo above, left and right, respectively, standing*). Season kickoff was a September 2017 workshop with guest leader Laura Kuhlman.

Each year different guest conductors bring music for the orchestra to practice and perform; they themselves also participate as players when not conducting. **Tom Bickley** (*center, standing in photo above*) was this year's guest conductor.

In the spring, BCRO gives at least one concert. Entitled "Harmony out of Chaos," its March 4 concert at Arlington Community Church in Kensington, CA, included

seven different works covering a wide range of eras-three contemporary pieces (including Bickley's minimalist, free-flowing You Cannot Have a Crowd Without *a Kitten*) to the Baroque (three movements of Vivaldi's Gloria, RV589, and a Handel aria), a Renaissance work by Verdelot, and the haunting Medieval Je sui aussi by Machaut. The event honored the memory of Kathy Cochran, friend of the Bay Area early music community for more than three decades, who asked to be remembered by the playing of music.

This year the early music community will also enjoy the **Berkeley Festival**, sponsored by the San Francisco Early Music Society and set for June 3-10 (*http://berkeleyfestival.org*). A multi-media program of Tielman Susato's music with a simultaneous display of art by Flemish Renaissance painter Pieter Bruegel was presented by the **Montclair (NJ) Early Music Consort** (MEMC) on January 21. The program took place in an historic mansion, Van Vleck House, as part of a concert series. Bruegel and Susato had some commonalities: both lived and worked in Antwerp, a gem of a city in the early 16th century; and both revered the peasantry. While Susato arranged and printed folk songs and dances sung in the taverns, Bruegel captured the merrymakers in his paintings.

Meeting weekly, with members encompassing beginner to professional, MEMC consists of recorder players, cornetto, gamba and percussion and presents several programs a year. RECORDER ORCHESTRA OF THE MIDWEST CELEBRATES 10 YEARS

I will never forget that afternoon in 2008, when I was at the supermarket parking lot and received a call from Louise "Weezie" Smith. She wanted to invite me to be the music director of a new recorder orchestra that she, Marilyn Flowers and Sue Meyer were forming, beginning that fall. The idea was to recruit



recorder players from the Midwest and rehearse six times per year in Bloomington, IN. I knew that anything that Weezie was a part of would be great. Before then, I had taught at the now-defunct Recorder Academy at Indiana University in Bloomington, where she was the director, and it was always a wonderful experience.

I was very surprised and honored to be invited, and humbly accepted the invitation. Soon after, I started planning the vision for this new project, and researching repertory for the **Recorder Orchestra of the Midwest** (ROMW).

Recorder orchestras have become the wave of the future. Inspired by a long history in Europe, recorder orchestras are popping up all over North America—where it is popular for players of all skill levels to come together in order to form a large recorder ensemble or a recorder orchestra.

ROMW members travel from all over the Midwest six times a year for an entire day of rehearsal. We present about two concerts per year. ROMW currently has 23 members and represents seven states. Not only do the recorder players have a great time learning, rehearsing and performing the chosen repertory, but they are also involved in building a spirit of community. It is wonderful to see that many friendships have formed during these years.

Several composers and arrangers have dedicated their time and creative energy to compose new pieces or to arrange well-known music for the recorder orchestra. In the last few years, three arrangements have been dedicated to ROMW: *Libertango*, originally by Astor Piazzolla and arranged by Peter Aristein; *Shadow of Your Smile*, originally by Johnny Mandel and arranged by Paul Leenhouts; *Downhill*, originally by Jake Smith and arranged by Matthias Maute.

In 2011, ROMW was part of the **First American Recorder Orchestra Conference** in Denver, CO, alongside the **Colorado Recorder Orchestra**, which is directed by **Rose Marie Terada**. We have also participated in two music series in Carmel, IN.

To celebrate the orchestra's 10th season, repertory has been chosen from previous programs. The exception is *Downhill*, which was written especially for this season by Weezie Smith's son, Jake Smith, and arranged by Maute in honor of Weezie.
